HARRY

HANGED FOR MURDERING HIS OWN BABY

Lehigh County, Pennsylvania, Has Its First

Legal Fx-cution.

Drowned His Three-Year-Old Daughter Because He Could Not Afford to Keep Her and Could Find No One Eise Who Would.

ALLENTOWN, O., Aug. 7.-Lehigh ounty's first legal hanging since the county was incorporated in 1812 took place this morning in the Allentown jail yard, Harry F. Johnson being the victim. The drop fell at 10:24, and death ensued at 10:35% from strangulation. The crime for which Harry Johnson was

JOHNSON'S CRIME

hanged was the murder of his 3-year-old daughter, Hertha, July 25, 1893.

Johnson, who was a shiftless sort of a fellow, had separated from his wife, the latter keeping the child. Finding it burdensome to maintain the child and herself by her abor she persistently domanded help from the father. Finally, on legal proceedings being instituted, Johnson agreed to pay a small sum weekly for its support. He kept up the payment for ten weeks and then stopped. Further demands from the mother for the child's support being unheeded, she left the child at Johnson's place of employ ment. Johnson took the child to his mother who kept it for four weeks, finally sending it back to him on the morning of July 25, 1893.

The child remained all day at the stable where her father worked. He made several n-ffectual attempts to have some one take charge of it. In the evening of that day, about 8 o'clock, Johnson borrowed a horse and buggy from his employer for the purpose as he said, of taking the child homo. He took her in the buggy with him and drove away. That was the last time the child was seen alive. Johnson returned alone to the stables in less than an hour. On July 31 the body of the child was found in the labels have a constant of the state.

n the Lehigh river. Suspicion at once pointed to the father as the guilty party, he having told many conflicting stories as to he disappearance of the child. He was arrested and at the coroner's inquest it said that he had given the child to a man from biladelphia, A man named Zimmerman estified that Johnson told him he met a man Philadelphia. n the street and gave the child away. The tories told were so conflicting that he was eld for court. He was tried before the ourt of over and terminer of Lehigh county. One of the witnesses, Annie Keller, who went to the livery stable on July 26 to seure the child for a Mrs. Roberts, testified hat Johnson told her that he had given the that Johnson fold her that he had given the child to a woman in the Sixth ward end he would see if the woman would give her up, telling Miss Keller to call on him the fol-lowing Friday. On Friday when Miss Kel-ler called Johnson told her the party would keep the child for two weeks. Other evi-dense of a like nature was readured and the fence of a like nature was produced and the lury brought in a verdict of murder in the first degree. He was sentenced to be first degree. He was sentenced to be hanged, but his attorneys had appealed to the supreme court. Justice Dean on May 23, 1894, handed down a lengthy opiolon con-firming the decision of the lower court. One week later Johnson made a confession, sey-ing that he murdered the achile hoccurs he ing that he murdered the child because h did not want to take care of it.

CAPTURED COUNTERFEITERS.

United States Secret Service Detectives

Make a Great Haul. NEW YORK, Aug. 7 .- United States secret tervice officers employed in the big counterfeiting case are filling the office of the secret. service bureau in this city with the paraphernalia with which the band were producing their spurious wealth. The plant of the counterfeiters is situated on a small farm at Bethel, Conn. Today Chief W. P. Hazen of he United States secret service department at Washington and Chief Forsythe of the New York division gave an outline of the work which has been done during the past three years. It appears the detectives have been working on the case since June 15. They made an important point when they arrested Samuel A. Massey, a restaurant keeper in this city. An advertisement in a New York City newspaper was answered by a person whose name is withheld. The latter, believing there was something wrong, took the letter received to the secret service bu-reau. It was answered by Chief Forsythe, who managed to bring the advertiser and the man who first replied to the advertisement together. The advertiser proved to be Marsey. He proposed to sell the other party \$3,400 worth of counterfelt money for \$100. Chief Forsythe was informed. He provided \$100 marked money and the deal was completed. Massey was arrested with the marked money in his possession. Then followed the arrest of Russel D. Hoyt at Bethel, Conn. Later J. W. Murphy was arrested and today held for examination on Friday. Saturday night last Lorenzo Hoyt, brother of Russel,


was arrested in Bethel, Conn., where he is now held. Detectives have been searching the premises where Lorenzo Hoyt lives for several days. They have been rewarded, Chief Forsythe today displayed \$12,000 in one package. This was in \$10 bank notes with the Webster head and were called good ounterfeits, Detectives are now digging up the ground

around the Hoyt house to find the printing press, which is believed to be huried. Among the plates found were the back and front plates and the United States treasury scal for a \$10 note on the Myslic River National bank of Mystic River, Conn.
