Fully Two Thousand Men Discharged from the Service of the "Overland" on Account of the Recent Strike-Other Railroad Affairs,

As a result of the recent strike on the Union Pacific 2,000 men are now looking for positions elsewhere. Service letters by the fiftles are being written by the department over which J. H. McConnell casts a watchful eye and invariably the letter closes with the single sentence "Discharged on account of the A. R. U. strike. Up to his discharge his work and conduct entirely satisfactory. These letters are in printed form and read

Mr. McConnell talked freely of the strike and its effects to a Bee representative. "Out of the 2,000 men who went out between Cheyenne and Huntington in sympathy with the A. R. U. on the Union Pacific 250 engineers and firemen are included in the list, the others being car repairers, hostlers, wipers, trainmen, pumpers and others in the locomotive and train service departments. Some of the engineers and firemen, particularly on the west end, were with the company for twenty lo not blame the company for the action taken, stating, however, that they were mis-led by the American Railway union and they made a mistake in going out at all. Notwithstanding, however, the feeling that ran riot along the Wyoming and Idaho divisions we had only two engines dis-abled. What might have occurred, however, had troops failed to take up stations along the western end of the line is a much monted question.

"In some cases the places of the strikers have been filled with new men, but so stagnant is business that we have accepted the situation and allowed many of the place o remain unfilled until business warrants an increase in pay roll."

Every man who went out on a strike is known at headquarters and the black list book has grown greatly since the reports have commenced to come in from division superintendents as to the number of men discharged and the causes leading up to their retirement from the service. In some cases telegraph operators have been dis-charged for using threatening language the co. to operators remaining loyal ne company. In others men "fired" for interfering with

United States troops, for malicious destruc-tion of property, for participating in labor demonstrations and incendiary utterances. All these reasons are set forth in the book opposite the name of the individual and they stand there as indisputable evidence of participation in the strike. Judge Caldwell Fills the Vacant Receiver-

CHICAGO, Aug. 16.-Judge Caldwell of the United States circuit court today on motion of Hon. Wheeler H. Peekham, representing the Union Trust company of New York as trustee and all the other parties to the reorganization, appointed Ablace F. Walker receiver of the Atchison property in place of J. W. Reinhart, resigned. being submitted to the court, the name of Mr. Walker had been approved in advance by the representatives of the London and Amsterdam committees of Atchison security holders, and by the general reorganization committee in New York. Mr. Walker's appointment is entirely agreeable to the two other receivers, and it is believed there will be entire harmony in the future conduct of the affairs of the Atchison system.

Aldace F. Walker, who is chairman of the Western Traffic association, has long been prominent in the railroad world. He was born in Rutland, Vt., in 1842 and went through the civil war, being mustered out a lieutenant colonel. He served two years as a Vermont state senator and was appointed by President Cleveland as one of the original members of the interstate commerce commission in 1887. In 1889 he resigned to bee me chairman of the interstate commerce commission and later accepted the chairmanship of the Western Traffic association. Immediately after the appointment of Mr.

Walker, Judge Caldwell left for St. where the order for the appointment of the receiver will be entered. Mr. Reinhart's resignation will be accepted immediately of the entering of the order.

The order for Mr. Walker's appointment

will take effect at once when entered at St. Paul, and will thus practically antedate Mr. Reinhart's resignation, which does not take effect until September 1. This fact has caused some comment, but Santa Fe officials deny that it has the slightest significance, o that any discourtesy is intended regarded the outgoing receiver. The officials that Mr. Reinhart's resignation The officials explain worded as to take effect September 1, or at such intervening date as his business with the road could be completed.
