Spirit of the Corn Market Was Broken Yest rday.

WHEAT WAS MODERATELY ACTIVE

Corn Was Less Active, with Fluctuations Confined Within Narrower Limits, and the Feeling Continued Rather Nervous and Unsettled.

CHICAGO, Aug. 17.-The spirit of the corn market was broken today, and its neighbors felt for and sympathized with it. It is %c lower for May and 1%c lower for September than it closed yesterday. Wheat dropped 152c of its former price. Oats are 1/2c lower and provisions show losses for the day. Wheat from Toledo being unloaded into Chicago elevators and heavy rail receipts were the chief causes of depression in that article.

Wheat was moderately active, within from 5kc to %c range. The feeling was unsettled, and fluctuations were quite frequent within the comparatively narrow limits. Initial transactions were at from %c to %c loss, at from 54% to 54% for September, but gradually worked up from %c to 56c, eased back from %c to %c, rallied from Me to %c, declined from %c to %c, and closed with September at from 54c to 5414c. The tone at the start was rather weak, owing to the heavy receipts on the inspec-tion chart, and was inclined to sell off, but the price in New York was firm and checked

he downward tendency. The New York quotations were watched quite closely all day and played an impor-tant part in the course of prices here. After the first advance a reaction occurred, due some to the break in the east and the sell-ing here by prominent local professionals, but railied again on the very fair exports and the falling oif some in the receipts at the primary markets. A cargo of \$7,000 bu, was inspected in arriving from Teledo, and reports of another 100,000 bu, being in the harbor, which would appear in temor-row's receipts. The export clearances of wheat and flour were fair and aggregate 416,000 bu. of wheat, of which 69,000 bu. was in flour. There was no fresh business reported at New York, but twelve leads were reported taken for expert at Baltimore. It was rumored that there was some business doing here today, but no particulars given

Corn was less active, with fluctuations con-fined within narrower limits. The feeling continued rather nervous and unsettled, but the undertone was rather more bearish and offerings, while not large, were more general, Apparently there was more disposition to favor the short side. The market acted as though the country had liquidated pretty freely and was now holding off buying. awaiting a still further break: Local professionals sold moderate quantities, and in some instances where western speculators had se-cured good profits, they were buying again on a smaller scale. The weather indication was for showers in Indiana and Illinois, fair and cooler in Iowa, and Missouri fair; Nobraska fair and cooler and Kansas fair, with southerly winds. Domestic markets were easier and cables came with spot firm and up 1/2d and futures nominal to 1/2d lower. The market opened with a decline of from %c to %c, at 54%c for September, but gradu-

ally sold up from %c to %c, worked back %c, rallied %c, declined %c and closed with September at 53%c.

The activity in oats was resumed again after yesterday's lay off, and not only was the market lively, but considerable business was transacted. The corn market continued to rule prices in oats and the easier feeling was entirely in sympathy with corn. The range for September was %c.

Provisions were active, opening firm on higher live hog prices, but soon declining on liberal offerings. A good demand developed at the decline and prices advanced, but the market again declined, reacting at the finish and closing steady.
