Evangelical Church Troubles Break Out in Washington Township.

JUDGE SMITH ACTS AS A MEDIATOR

By the Terms of the Truce Each Faction Will Use the Church Alternately and Week Day Nights Will Be Apportioned Between Them.

The Evangelical church in Washington township, like all the other churches of that denomination in the country, are at sixes and sevens on account of the two factions in the church at large, the one headed by Bishops Esher and Bowman, and the other by Bishop Dubbs. Last Sunday the two factions had each arranged for a service at the 'meetin' house" at the same hour. Rev. G. L. Springer was to do the preaching for the Dubbs faction, and Rev. Mr. Fee for the Esher-Bowmanites. The two clergymen had not met before, and as it was not thought best to begin their acquaintance with a fight, Fee decided to back down and let Springer breach. This he did, to the great edification f his audience, for something over an hour, when he called upon Brother Fee to pray.

"Brother Fee got up to pray," remarked Frank Shinn of Carson, who was attorney for one of the parties and was consequently atending church at a mater of business, "and he devoted his whole time and attention to asking the Lord to soften Brother Springer's heart so that he might let him have a chance preach next Sunday. Just as he was about close his prayer he suddenly remembered hat the congregation ought not to be for cotten, and he stopped with, 'O Lord, bless his congregation. Amen.' 'He then notified his followers that between then and next Sunday he would sue out a writ of injunction ind bring it along with him so that they might come up to church with the full belief that they would hear some preaching from

heir own side of the fence.
In the controversy between the two fac ions of the denomination the supreme court has already decided that the Esber-Bowman faction is the church, but the Dubbsites have etitioned for a rehearing. When the conestants appeared before Judge Smith yester lay afternoon the greater part of Washingto twomship was there to see what would be done. Judge Smith acted as meditator and induced the two parties to settle the differences until the case is finally determined by the supreme court. By an agreement which was then entered into the Esher Bowman faction are to have the use of the building on alternate Sundays, and on such venings during the week as will not inter-ere with the plans of the Dubbs faction. Heavy Claim of Mr. Anandale for False Arrest and Ex radition. QUEBEC, Aug. 21.-Quite a sensational story has been told here in connection with the arrest made in February last of Hugh Anandale under charge of embezzlement from the Bank of Newcastle, England. Anandale, whose extradition had been granted by the American authorities, was tried in England and acquitted, his innocence being clearly proven. The following is the summary of the story told by the man himself: A man named Arnold ran away with a large sum of money belonging to the bank and crossed over to America. He landed at New York, and while driving to Baltimore in a wagon was the victim of a serious accident, and was taken to a hospital. He made the acquaintance of a patient suffering with a grave disease of the lungs. The patient's name was Mr. Anandale. Serious fears were entertained for Mr. Anandale, and thinking the latter would never leave the hospital, Arnold disappeared and traveled under the name of Anandale, and thus succeeded in foiling the police. One night he was killed in a railroad accident at Baltimore, and the coroner, not knowing that the deceased was a criminal, informed the family in England and held the usual inquest. Later on the police, put on the false track, made the arrest of Mr. Anandale, who had recovered and left the hospital, and the latter was delivered to the British authorities and tried with the

BIG FOUR DEPOT BURNED.

Cincinnati Railroad Yards Visited by a De-

structive Conflagration. CINCINNATI, Aug. 21.-The Big Four freight depot and arjoining buildings were burned today, causing a loss estimated from \$390,000 to \$570,000. When the alarm sounded at 2:40 p. m., such a serious re-sult was not apprehended, but the flames sult was not apprehended, but the flames afterwards spread with destructiveness. The big depot was bounded by Third and Wood streets and Central avenue. It was burned with damage to all the surrounding property, including the street car lines passing that vicinity. Captain Romus, Lieutenant Cavanaugh and Fireman Groft were badly hurt by falling timbers. The government bonded warehouse adjoining the depot was burned, with valuable contents. Two negroes have been arrested on suspicion of setting fire to the building. The cause is also attributed to the explosion of a gasoline stove used by men tarring the roof of the depot, and to sparks from engines on the fresh tar. Many cars, including Pullmtn and Wagner coaches, were burned in the adjacent building.

The most carefully revised information about the fire is as follows: It started in the cid receiving depot adjacent to the Big Four yards on the south side of Third street, extending 450 feet east from Wood street. It was caused by the xplosion of a gasoline stove inside the depot used to heat roofing tar. The total loss is \$300,000, with \$140,000 insurance.



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
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
