Disturbances in Distilling the Leading

Feature on 'Change. NEW YORK, Aug. 27.-This was an exciting day on the Stock exchange by reason of the speculation in the stock of the Distilling and Cattle Feeding company. It was generally understood at the close of business on Saturday that the funds required to take the company's spirits out of bond had been practically assured and that impression prevailed at the opening of business this morning. There was consequently a brisk demand for the company's stock, which sold up to 2214 on the opening dealings, a gain of 2 per cent on Saturday's closing. Very soon, however, came reports of a hitch in the loan negotiations, and on the announcement by Russel Sage that they had fallen through a break to 19% e was made. The trust people themselves, however, refused to speak on the subject and traders came into the market buy at the decline, sending the price up

Not for long was the improvement maintained, a very uncertain feeling being appar-ent among the operators in the stock, and on confirmatory reports that the attempt make the loan here was a failure the price fell to 18½, a decline of 3% per cent from the highest of the morning, and a break of 6¼ per cent from the top figures of Saturday. Purchases to cover short contracts per cent, the last sale being made at a figure only ½ per cent below Saturday's final price. It was not known at the close of business here whether the company had given up the fight for the loan, for although it had been abandoned, there was a possibility that the move might be yet successful in




