Short Line Receivership Puts it in Control of Puget Sound Business.

RESULT OF GREAT BENEFIT TO THE SYSTEM What Might Have Happened Had the Court Made a Different Appointment When the Matter Was First Brought Up.

he appointment of separate receivers for the Oregon Short Line, who, by the way, hapsened to be the receivers of the Union Pacific, as in the case of the Kansas Pacific, President S. H. H. Clark quietly slipped into Omaha yesterday, leaving his special car on the Council Bluffs side. Mr. Clark accompanied by Mrs. Clark and his son, Hoxle Clark, who graduated in June from

There can be no particular import attached President Clark's visit at this time, for he has been expected for days. Instead, however, of going to St. Louis from We-queton-Sing, where he spent several days during last week with Judge Henry Caldwell, he came direct to this city from Chicago via the Northwestern.

The appointment of separate receivers for the Oregon Short Line on original instead of ancillary bill shows that Judge Riner has evidently received his instructions from his superior officer, Judge Caldwell, as to this appointment, and may be directly traceable the visit of President Clark to the man

who gave the veteran railroad director a leave of absence for six months. The appointment of the Union Pacific receivers over the Oregon short Line con-siderably strengthens the "Overland" situation, and gives the key to the Sound com try in the hands of the Union Pacine. Should the road have broken away from the fold, as in the case of the Oregon Rallway & Navigation company and the Union Pacific, Denver & Gulf company, it would have seriously embarrassed the main line, and earnings would have fallen off in consequence. Had things been different the Bur-lington, Rio Grande, and even the Rock Rock Island might have gone into the Sound coun Island might have gone into the Sound country on a traffic basis, but now the Union Pacific is in a position to fight the boycott inaugurated in 1892 against the road because it demanded the long haul one way. This appointment of Judge Riner of Wyoming closes the Ogden gateway in the interest of the Union Pacific, and it will continue to entered.

FILLMORE HAS BACKED DOWN.

Huntington's Protest Induced Him to Relax His Persecution of Strikers.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 29.-Superintenlent F. J. Fillmore of the Southern Pacific has modified his attitude toward those entaged in the recent strike. Just after the strike he was quoted as saying that none of the leading strikers should ever obtain work in California if he could help it and if any secured positions he would try to have them discharged. These threats caused much indignation and President C. P. Huntington wrote a sharp reprimand to him from New Wrote a state required Mr. Fillmore to make a supplementary statement in which he denies he said he would hunt down the ex-strikers and drive them out of their posi-

"I am not interfering with anybody," explained Mr. Fillmore. "The men who de-stroyed our property, stole our trains and killed our employes are on the blacklist. This list goes to other roads. It is a custom which has been in vogue for years."
"If an ex-striker can get work you do not propose to interfere then?" Mr. Fillmore was

"Certainly not," he replied, "except so far the blacklist may come against him. There are strikers now scattered all over the state picking fruit or hops." A second letter has been received from Mr.

Huntington in which he again referred to Fillmore's threats, saying: "I cannot believe any one would say anything so malicious and

SNAP FOR THE SCALPERS. Hutchinson & Southern Tickets in the

Hands of Brokers. CHICAGO, Aug. 29 .- The Hutchinson & Southern road has fallen under the displeasure of the Western Passenger lines for the alleged manipulation of tickets which are being used to scalp the local business of some of the local western lines. Chairman Caldwell has informed the Hutchinson & Southern that the market at Kansas City has been flooded with tickets of its issue, all of them being in the hands of brokers, and has called upon the road for an explana-tion. When the report has been received the roads will decline to honor the tickets issued by the Hutchinson & Southern. On September 15 the Chicago Great West-

ern will inaugurate an addition to its train service. It will start a new train daily at 1.30 p. m. for St. Paul, Des Moines and Kansas City. Shoshone Shops to Close Permanently J. H. McConnell, superintendent of motive power and machinery of the Union Pacific, was in Cheyenne Monday. In conversation with a reporter for the Daily Tribune of that city upon the situation he is quoted as saving that Nebraska crops are a total loss and that the farmers of the state would have little or nothing to ship this year. 'In many places off the main line in Nebraska a passenger coach is now attached to a freight train, this taking the place of the former daily passenger service. In other places the daily service has been reduced to tri-weekly.

These changes all took place resterday. "Now," said the superintendent, "it not follow because the train service in Ne-braska has been reduced that no increase will be made in the working force at Cheyenne. The shops at Shoshone, Idaho, will be permanently closed on September 1 and the men employed there will be sent to other points. Of these Cheyenne will get her full share. Shoshone is not even a division point and it has been found useless to keep the shops there open."

Mr. McCounell said that from the begin-

ning of the strike the management had de-termined to see that the men who had been loyal to the company should have work, and this policy would be carried out. Petitions had been pouring into the office of General Superintendent Dickinson from all points ask-ing that men be reinstated, and all were be-ing given due consideration.

With reference to a transfer of the Denver shops to the Gulf road, Mr. McCannell said

that the matter had been talked of ever since the appointment of a separate receiver for the Denver & Gulf, and that it probably would get no further than talk. He said that comparatively more men were now cm-

ployed in the shops at Cheyende than a sup-point west of that place.

The superintendent will extend his tour over the main line and the Short Line, and will occupy about two weeks in doing it.
