Government May Lose What it Has Given to

Western Railroads.

Prospect That the First Mortgage Holders Will Take Everything in Sight-Transcontinental Lines Getting Together-The Burlington Extension.

The talk in Salt Lake of attempting to have the newly appointed receivers of the Oregon Short Line and the Utsh Northern set aside and other receivers appointed who have no connection with the Union Pacific gives little uneasiness at Union Pacific headquarters. Officials there state that the talk entirely visionary, as the circuit court has passed on the question and undoubtedly will continue to hold a friendly interest in

the property. The way the receivership business is work ng out for the Union Pacific begins to have the appearance of a very shrewd game on he part of these vitally interested. Not so such a game probably as an an inevitable se-

It is very much doubted if those roads having separate receivers will pay more than their operating expenses acting inde pendently of the main line, and should they not do so foreclosure is inevitable, and then the first mortgage holders will take the property, wiping out the government lish and all other liens, for that matter, including the consolidated bondholders' mortgage. The purpose of separate receivers simply to show the earning capacity of roads. Some people believe the Kansas Pacific and the Oregon Short Line will develop into paying properties and be able not only to pay operating expenses, but a certain portion of the mortgage indebtedness. This is stoutly denied by these who are in a position to know. If the latter con-dition be proven true then the government

will be the sufferer.
Contingent upon the development in the
Kansas Pacific and Short Line companies depends the action of foreclosure on the main line of the Union Pacific. There is a debt of \$28,000,000 against this line of a thousand and odd miles. It is asserted that the road would not bring more than the first mortgage indebtedness, and that it could be duplicated for \$25,000 per mile, in which case the Union Pacific proper would not bring an amount equivalent to its first mortgage. Should this prove true, the government debt would be cancelled as well as all outstanding indebtedness against the company, and the first mortgage holders enter into indisputable possession of the property. These conditions are not chargeable to the clever minds among the receivers, but are made absolutely necessary by svents.

### MOLONEYS AMENDED PETITION. Further Charges Made Against the Puli-

man Palace Car Company. CHICAGO, Sept .4 .- Attorney General Moloney has prepared his amended petition in the quo warranto proceedings commenced

by him against the Pullman Palace Car company. Mr. Moloney has served notice upon the attorneys for the Pullman company that he will appear before Judge Gibbons at the criminal court tomorrow afternoon and ask leave to file the amended petition and also the information against the company which follows the petition, according to the law governing quo warranto pro-

eedings. The main additional charges made in the amended petition are in relation to the Pull-man company without charter authority operating a gas plant and brick works. The court is also told that the Pullman company realizes a large profit by selling water to the Pullman residents. The company also, it is represented, supplies steam heat to many of the business houses and apartment houses for pecuniary profit. The mainten-ence of a "truck farm" by the company is charged, and this, the court is told, cannot be covered by a charter to manufacture railroad cars. The sale of liquors by the Pullman company in its cars while in tran-sit, is also deemed by the petition to be a

direct violation of its charter rights. The ownership of seventeen acres occupied land south of Lake Calumet by the Pullman company is attacked. The petition says that this amounts to a real estate

### speculation. OBJECTS TO BEING ENJOINED.

in Court. ST. LOUIS, Sept. 4.—The American Railway union, Eugene V. Debs and others, defendants in the injunction cases growing out of the late strike, by their counsel, have filed a demurrer to the bill of complaint introduced by the government. In their de-murrer the defendants ask for judgment, insufficiency. The defendants demur on the following grounds, among others: The court has no jurisdiction of the subject; that the complainant has not the legal capacity to bring this action; that no act of congress au-thorizes any action by the United States against persons with whom it has no conagainst persons with whom it has no con-tractual relations in that regard to enjoin the abstraction or retarding of the United States mail, and the United States has no power or authority so to proceed; that no act of congress authorizes an action or proceeding in equity by the United States against those not common carriers to enjoin the hindrance, interference with or destruc-tion of trade or commerce among the several states, and the United States has no power nor authority so to proceed; that the court has no power to enjoin any offense against the penal laws of the United States; that any act of congress purporting to give to a court of equity power to enjoin any offense against the penal laws of the United States is in conflict with the fifth and sixth amend

Evidence in the Contempt Case-Prelate's Answer to Complaint, The hearing of Bishop Scannell on the charge of contempt growing out of the St. Paul's church litigation was begun before Judge Scott yesterday. The matter was set for 9 o'clock, but was continued until afternoon in order to allow the attorney for the bishop to make a written showing in At the afternoon session the court room was filled with witnesses and other inter-ested parties. Attorney Smythe read his answer, in which he alleged that the bishop had never been served with the restraining order and that he had never had the possession of the keys to the church, which seems to be the principal thing in the controversy. He took the ground that the restraining order

was not mandatory in its character, that the court did not intend that the bishop should give up the keys, but simply leave matters as they were until such time as the original suit should be decided. Some time was occupied in unimportant discussion of legal points between the attorneys and then Judge Scott ruled that the showing of the defense was not sufficient and that the order of attachment for con-

tempt should issue. This paved the way for the introduction of evidence and Anton Inga was called as the first witness. He stated that he was a member of St. Paul's church and had known Bishop Scannell for about three years. John K waleski he had been appointed as a committee at a parishioners' meeting to call on the hishop and find out what he was going to do about opening the church. This was some days after Father Tzeska had closed the church and left the city. On that occasion the bishop had accused him of being the author of the injunction proceedings, which he denied, and Kowaleski shouldered the responsibility of that action. He had called the bishop's attention to the fact that they wanted the church opened so they could have the regular meetings of the societies and the children's school, but the bishop had told them that until they had ceased their factional fights and had made arrangements to pay their debts he should not send them a priest or allow the church to be opened. He refused to give them the keys and declared that if they went near the church or attempted to open it he would have them all arrested.

Kowaleski was called and corroborated the
