



Simmons, a young business man of Sherman. The tragedy oc-curred in a public street at Decatur and has produced a genuing sensation. Miss Mollie Simmons, daughter of Dr. Simmons, sister to the accused, has been an art teacher in Northwest Texas Baptist college at Decatur, but resides at Sherman. While at the former place a scandal was circulated which involved Miss Simmons and Witt. It is alleged that undue intimacy existed between them and

Witt openly beasted of it.

The brother, upon learning of his sister's betrayal, came here after Witt, but the latter boarded the first train for Decatur. Simmons left soon afterwards and found Witt walking along the street, when he fired two bullets into his heart. He was accompanied by his brother, Ed A. Simmons, a member of the Texas legislature. Witt has relatives in St. Louis and Chicago. He came here three years ago from Decatur. Young Simmons is in jail at Decatur.

# DEMANDS A DIFFERENTIAL

Freight Rates in the Transmississippi Country a Source of Trouble,

UNION PACIFIC WILL BE A STRONG FACTOR

Franscontinental Affairs Not by Any Means us Near Solution as Was at First Thought -Woes of the Tax commissioner of the Union Pacific.

The likelihood of an egreement being reached at the meeting of transcontinental roads in Chicago grows more remote as the representatives of the various lines roads today in Chicago grows more remote as the representatives of the various lines appreciate the importance of the demands of various lines. Some time ago, or during the early days of the meeting last week, the Great Northern and Northern Pacific created considerable consternation in transcontinental ranks by demanding higher differentials than heretofore accorded them, this by reason of traffic agreements made with the Oregon Railway & Navigation company. Now, a new feature arises through the Union Pacific's demand for a differential ria the Oregon Short Line in the event a differential is granted the Navigation company's demand.

Mr. Lomax stated yesterday that the Union Pacific was opposed to differentials of any kind, but if there was a disposiof any kind, but if there was a disposi-tion shown to grant a differential in favor of the Oregon Railway company, there was no good reason why the same differential should not be granted the Oregon Short Line, which is still a part of the Union Pacific. 'We certainly would not allow the Oregon Navigation road to reap any more Oregon Navigation road to reap any more benefit from their position than we ourselves possess. It is the height of foolishness to presume that we would. We are still engaged in Pacific coast traffic, and if business going via St. Paul is favored by the association in the way of differentials, then business via the Missouri river gateways must be accorded the same privileges. This is the Union Pacific's new and by right impregnable position. Should it be conceded it would relieve the western roads from the embarrassment under which they have labored ever since the Canadian Pacific took its differentials by main force, because it was in a position to take them. Should the Union Pacific's position be endersed western roads would be able to place the same class of business, taking different gateways, on exactly the same forting, and the reason for ceping up the fight would be

Mr. Lomax of the Union Pacific has gone over to the meeting at Chicago, Mr. Richard Gray of the Southern Pacific representing Mr. Lomax in the latter's absence. But Mr. Lomax was of the opinion that an agreement would not be reached, that new conditions would make it impossible.

#### WOES OF THE TAX COMMISSIONER. of the Methods Used in Getting the Railreads Taxed for Schools.

Much has been said by the newspapers of Omaha regarding the rather questionable methods pursued by school census takers, janitors and others connected with the public schools of this city to secure money from the treasury by means that, to say the least, have been of a shady character, but these transactions are purity personified alongside the methods adopted by some of the school districts in the counties of the state where the railroads pay the greater proportion of the taxes. Making a total of \$2,231.66 for the education of seven pupils during the last school year in the three districts mentioned. Of this amount the Union Pacific railroad paid in taxes \$1,693.12, or above 70 per cent of the total amount, which if added to the railroad in these districts would make about

90 per cent of the total levy which the railroad must pay. These little stretches or conscience, how-ever, are nothing to a Kansas county through which the Kansas Pacific passes. In that the inhabitants organized six school districts in one township, all the districts bordering on the railroad which must bear its proportion of the taxes, \* in homest aders and are not compelled to pay taxes except on proving up after five years So flagrant was the attempt to make th railroad build all the school houses that the attorney general of Kansas began a suit in the name of the state to have the Sixth district annulled on the ground that there are not enough children of school age to warrant the creation of a district. Affidavits on file show that some of the children re-puted to be of school age are babies in arms, while others were imported from other districts for the purpose of padding the school census. They have built their school house, however with a fine cyclone cellar. Should the district be closed the loss will not fall on the residents, but on

#### RAN INTO RUNAWAY CARS.

#### USED HIS SHIRT FOR A SIGNAL. Farmer's Plucky Method of Saving a Train

from a Terrible Disaster. ST. PAUL, Sept. 5.-The morning train from Chicago on the Wisconsin Central was saved from a bad wreck near Stevens Point by a plucky farmer. The train was approaching that place at 2 o'clock when signaled by a flame that quickly went out. On stopping the train it was found wreckers had been at work, but were frightened away by a man living near, who tore off his shirt and lighting it signaled the train.
