

Freight Rates in the Transmississippi Country a Source of Trouble. UNION PACIFIC WILL BE A STRONG FACTOR Transcontinental Affairs Not by Any Means as Near Solution as Was at First Thought -Wees of the las commissioner of the Union Pacific, The likelihood of an agreement being reached at the meeting of transcontinental toads in Chicago grows more remote as the representatives of the various lines roads today in Chicago grows more remote as the representatives of the various lines. appreciate the importance of the demands of various lines. Some time ago, or during the early days of the meeting last week, the Great Northern and Northern Pacific created considerable consternation in transcontinenat ranks by demanding higher differentials than heretofore accorded them, this by reason of traffic agreements made with the Oregon Railway & Navigation company. Now, a new feature arises through the Union Pacific's demand for a differential via the Oregon Short Line in the event a differential is granted the Navigation company's demand. Mr. Lomax stated yesterday that the Union Pacific was opposed to differentials of any kind, but if there was a disposi-tion shown to grant a differential in favor of

the Oregon Railway company, there was no good reason why the same differential should not be granted the Oregon Short Line, which is still a part of the Union Pacific. "We certainly would not allow the Oregon Navigation road to reap any more benefit from their position than we our-selves possess. It is the height of foolishness to presume that we would. We are still engaged in Pacific coast traffic, and if business going via St. Paul is favored by the association in the way of differentials, then business via the Missouri river gateways must be accorded the same privileges." This is the Union Pacific's new and by right impregnable position. Should conceded it would relieve the western Should it be roads from the embarrassment under which they have labored ever since the Canadian Pacific took its differentials by main force, because it was in a position to take them. RAN INTO RUNAWAY CARS.

Engine of an Express Train Thrown Over a Bridge-Fireman Killed.

COLUMBUS, O., Sept. 5 .- A remarkable collision occurred on the Baltimore & Ohio just west of this city. A wildcat train of ten loaded coal cars which started two miles east of the scene of the collision ran into the Baltimore & Ohio Cincinnati and Pittsburg express on the bridge over the Olentangy river. The runaway cars were running about four miles an hour. The engine of the passenger train plowed under the coal cars and went off the bridge into the river, pulling the baggage car with it. The sleeper and

two day coaches remained on the track One span of the bridge was carried down and the coal cars were piled upon the engine in the river. Fireman William Herbert was crushed to death. Engineer Joseph Small-wood was hurled out into the river and escaped with several bad cuts. Three train-men who were caged in the baggage car miraculously escaped. Burnie Burton, 11 years old, had her arm broken. No other assengers were hurt beyond a few scratches each and bruises.

Farmer's Plucky Method of Saving a Train from a Terrible Disaster.

ST. PAUL, Sept. 5 .- The morning train from Chicago on the Wisconsin Central was saved from a bad wreck near Stevens Point by a plucky farmer. The train was approaching that place at 2 o'clock when signaled by a flame that quickly went out. On stopping the train it was found wreckers had been at work, but were frightened away by a man living near, who tore off his shirt and lighting it signaled the train. It appears about midnight a gang of men displaced the tracks by tearing off the fish plates and drawing the spikes. Right at this point is a high precipice and it was the evident intention to ditch the train and hurl it down the incline. No clew is had to the miscreants nor is there any knowledge of their motives in wrecking the train.


