BUSINESS GROWING BETTER

Quantity of Freight Moving from the Pacific Coast Eastward.

RAILROAD PROSPECTS IN THE WEST

Supt. McConnell's Report on Union Pacific Business and Prospects After a Tour of the System-Rates to Be Restored-Rallway Notes.

Superintendent of Motive Power J. H. Mcconnell has returned from a tour of inspecion over the western division of the Union Pacific. While in Idaho Mr. McConnell enoyed several days' fine trout fishing.

Speaking of the business outlook, he said that about four weeks ago nearly 700 cars of green fruit were tied up in the Sacramento yards of the Southern Pacific. So solid was the jam that it became necessary for the Southern Pacific to ask for help from the Union Pacific, which was granted, and eight engines and crews were loaned the company to assist in clearing the blockade.

"This has about been accomplished," said Mr. McConnell, "and the fruit business from this on will be of moderate volume. The fruit growers along the Snake river in Idaho raise a magnificent quality of fruit, but the alsers have not combined, as they have in California. The result is that but few cars are sent out of the Suake country, growers bringing in a few boxes of fruit at a time, and as there are not enough to fill a car, they are sold to local dealers. Stock from Montana, Idaho and Washington is

mencing to move, and this will keep the road busy until cold weather sets in.

"I found the road in excellent condition, the rolling stock in first class order, and everything working harmoniously. I also found a good many of the old employes out of employment. I talked with many of them, but as business is not what it should be, I could give them little encouragement as to he probabilities of getting back."

SAVING RECEIVERS' FEES.

Sixty Thousand a Year Saved to the Northern Pacific-Twenty-Four Dropped Off. MILWAUKEE, Sept. 10 .- The twenty-four receivers of the Northern Pacific branch lines appointed simultaneously by Judge Jenkins and courts in Minnesota, have been retired under an arrangement between the receivers, the reorganization committee and the Farmers Loan & Trust company of New York, by which the trust company operates the lines for a limited sum per annum. By the arrangement over \$60,000 per annum

will be saved. The receivers were appointed last October. Henry Stanonton and Alexander McKengle being apointed receivers for most of the branches. By the new arrangements none of the leases are to extend beyond the life of the main line receiverships. Counsels are now on their way west to consummate the

Negotiations have also been closed by which the Spokane & Palouse road and the Northern Pacific and Puget Sound Shore roads have been leased to the main line receivers, the former at a reduced interest charge of \$41,490 the first eighteen months and \$20,085 the second eighteen months. The Puget Sound Shore road lease calls for a reduced interest charge of \$41,490 the first eighteen months and \$20,745 the second The new arrangement makes a great step

oward the effective reorganization of the Northern Pacific road. TESTIMONY ON THE CRIPPLED ROADS

Master in Chancery Cornish to Give a Hearing Tomorrow. NEW YORK, Sept. 10.-The announcement that a meeting of the government directors of the Union Pacific railroad is to be held in this city tomorrow is not correct so far as is known, as the official receivers of the company here, where it is stated that no date for the next meeting has yet been

fixed. Master in Chancery Cornish will give a hearing in this city tomorrow to take testi-mony bearing upon the continued operation by the Union Pacific receivers of the small lines in Kansas, Wyoming, Colorado and Oregon known as the Crippled roads, concerning which the receivers have asked instructions from the court. He will also take proofs bearing on the requests of the receivers as to their obligations on a number of outstanding contracts, the more important of which grow out of the lease of the Oregon Railway & Navigation, the traffic arrangement with the Union Pacific, Denver & Gulf, the Oregon Short Line, the Union Pacific, Lincoln and Colorado, the St. Joseph & Grand Island, the Kansas City & Omaha and other small lines. The hearing is continued in pursuance of the order made last July by Judge Sanborn of St. Paul.

N. Y. AND N. E.'S TROUBLES.

Forcelosure Decree Signed by Judge Wal-lace of Providence. BOSTON, Sept. 10 .- T. Jefferson Coolidge. ir., treasurer of Old Colony Trust company, and receiver of the New York & New England railroad, said to an Associated press reporter today that Judge Wallace of Providence had signed the foreclosure decree against the New England property in Massa-chusetts and Rhode Island, and that it would be brought to this city immediately and

West Missouri River Rates. There is a growing feeling that the rates from Missouri river gateways to Colorado and Utah common points will be restored in a very short time. When this is done one strong factor against the formation of a new transcontinental association will be removed. These rates base on rates from Montana to Pacific coast points, and should they be raised to the original standard it would considerably increase revenue. A gentleman who has just returned from the transcontinental meeting said that the ocean differential has given considerable bother, but thought no agreement would be made until the Santa Fe and Southern Pa-cific buried their differences between Los Angeles and San Francisco.

"As a principle," said he, "all roads are opposed to differentials, but as a matter of business policy some roads are compelled to require differentials in order to compete for business. It is at present the business of railroad men to conserve revenue, and this gives me hope that the members of transcontinental lines will get together. As to the scalp, should the Canadian Pacific secure the differential, it cannot affect us very much at Missouri river gateways. It will only be at extreme points on both coasts that business will feel the scalp at all.
"As to the rumor that the Union Pacific, Burlington, Rock Island and Rio Grande had reached a conclusion that the boycott should be lifted and would combine against northern lines for the protection of their interests, there is no truth in it, although I want to say that it is the one thing to do. It is seriously being considered but nothing has been done as yet."

CHICAGO, Sept. 10.-Taken as a whole, freight traffic on the railroads is now better than it was this time last year. A large increase in westbound shipments is reported and it is steadily growing. It may be but a temporary spurt, but the roads are drawing from it all the encouragement they can. A call was issued by the Rock Island road today for the conference of the Texas lines in St. Louis tomorrow to consider existing de-

New Street (leaning Device

A new device for street cleaning has recently been patented by Omaha parties and it promises to almost revolutionize the mode of cleaning the highways and byways. It is automatic, taking the dirt up and passing it through a dust separator and depositing it in a cart, which is attached behind. When the cart is full by an ingenious contrivance a bell is rung, as if by magic, which gives the driver the tip to stop and have the full cart detached and have it replaced by an

empty one.

The machine is hauled by two horses and the power to run the fans and brushes neces-sary for the street cleaning process is in-dependent of the traction. This machine does away altogether with the necessity of street sprinkling. It is dustless and can be used in the day time on atreets with little traffic.
