

They will declare themselves and show their hand at the forthcoming annual gathering of the stockholders. It is not their present intention to make any changes in the management of the road. They have been looking into the record of Vice Presi dent and General Manager McDoel since he took the management, and they are well pleased with the result.

NEW YORK, Sept. 12.-The directors of the Western Union Telegraph company today declared the regular quarterly dividend of 14 per cent, payable October 1, to stockholders of record September 20. The statement of the quarter ending September 30, partly estimated, shows not revenue of \$1.800,000, deducting interest and sinking fund charges of \$243,500; also deducting \$550,000 for the purchase of the American Rapid Transit Telegraph company leaves a balance of \$1,000,500, less dividend of \$1,132,000, makes the deficit of the quarter \$185,500, which being deducted from hist quarter's surplus of \$7,007,633, leaves the accrued surplus of the company \$6,822,132.

the company \$6,822,142.

The telegraph lines and property of the American Rapid Telegraph company was purchased with 5,500 shares of capital stock issued out of the increased stock authorized by the stockholders on October 21, 1892. Had it not been for its purchase the Western Union surplus above dividend requirements would have been \$564,500, compared with \$381,654 for the last quarter. The improve-ment in the business of the company is in-dicated by the fact that revenues for the quarter are \$1,800,000, the same as for the September quarter last year and about \$350, 000 in excess of the revenues for the June quarter. The surplus for the June quarter was increased \$40,000 by the return to the company by the sinking fund trustees of that sum on account of drawn bonds not being presented for redemption.

The next telegram bore the name of Debs and asked if gram bore the name of Debs and asked it the Mobile & Ohio road belonged to the General Managers association. General Managers association. Upon Mr. Scales' assurance by wire that it did not a telegram was sent asking Mr. Scales to call on Dwyer, the local representative of the A. R. U., and make arrangements with him regarding the calling off of the strike. This, Mr. Scales testified, he did, and read the agreement which he had with Dwyer. The telegrams were all pixed in evidence. The telegrams were all placed in evidence. One of the attorneys for the government said if the telegrams could be positively traced to Debs in this case his directing hand in the strike would be positively ustablished.

James Connors was the first messenger boy witness called today. He testified to having delivered messages to various A. R. U. officials, among them President Debs. He swore positively to having delivered at least three to Debs, personally, and identified the president's signature on the delivery Gus Weblers, also a messenger,

similar testimony, and said he had given several telegrams into Debs' hands.

Fred Miller, who was stationed at the Revere house, Debs' headquarters, during the strike, declared that he had delivered telegrams to each of the defendants. On cross examination he contributed to the defendants. examination he pointed out the defendants in the court room. Several other messenger boys were examined, and then Direct Hogan of the A. R. U. took the stand. Hogan furnished

PLANS FOR IMPROVEMENT.

Consolidation Committee Discusses Project of Economical Municipal Administration. There was an attempt made last night to have a conference of the joint committee, composed of members of the Omaha city

council, members of the South Omaha city council, members of the Board of County Commissioners and citizens, appointed some time ago for the purpose of bringing about a plan for the consolidation of the city government of the two cities and the creation of the county of Omaha. While but few of the members attended the meeting, those who were on hand, gathered in the council chamber, where for an hour they discussed the propositions in an informal way and then decided that the best thing to do was to wait and see what action was to be taken by the committee which the mayor appointed last Tuesday night for a similar purpose. President Howell of the Omaha city coun-cil contended that by a consolidation of offices a large amount of money could be

saved to the taxpayers each year, and was of the opinion that if the county and municipal governments of Omaha and South Omaha were merged under one it would be a saving all around. County Commissioner Livesey gave it as his opinion that such a plan would result in the abolishment of several expensive of-

in the abolishment of several expensive of-fices, but he had doubts about the politicians accepting the proposition. He believed that they would fight it in the legislature. W. S. Poppleton quoted some law, or rather some of the provisions of the consti-tution of the state and knocked the whole scheme in the head. He showed to the members of the committee that there was a constitutional provision which prohibited the establishment of a county, the area of establishment of a county, the area of which would be less than 400 square miles. By dividing the county of Douglas, the area of the new county would be less than was required by the constitution of the state. In his opinion there was nothing to do in this direction but to wait and have the pro-position submitted to the voters of the state as an amendment to the constitution. He thought that a good plan would be to get the matter in shape and have it submitted at the general election in 1896.

City Engineer Resewater took the position that there were several city departments which could be abalished and consolidated, and in this particular he took occasion to state that a consolidation of departments would save money to the taxpayers and at the same time give the public more for the money. The City of Washington, he thought, was the best governed city of which he had any knowledge, and there

the entire government was under the direc-tion of three men.

Mr. Howell thought that nine councilmen Mr. Howell thought that nine councilment could do better work and more of it than eighteen. The present council was too unwelldly and usually spent \$50 worth of time to perform \$5 worth of work. Nearly all that came before the council originated in some other department, and in the office of the city engineer, as a rule. He thought that in order to prevent a conflict the best thing was to have the committee defer any action until it was known what the mayor's committee proposed to do. committee proposed to do.
