Commodity Tariffs Will Go Up in the Wake of Class Freights.

CHANGES ON PACIFIC COAST POINTS

Union Pacific Calls Upon "The Soo" to Get Into Line-New Train Service from California to New Orleans ... Rail Notes

Commodity rates to the north Pacific coast erminals are to be advanced in keeping with the advance in class rates published some days ago. A check of the rates was recently completed in Chicago and everybody seemed satisfied to put the new rates into effect. When the vote was asked for on the question of time the rates should become effective, it was ascertained the "Soo" line, which is a part of the Canadian Pacific, withheld its vote on the theory that there was too much of a discrimination against Portland and in favor of San Francisco. This matter put a dan per on the matter, but the Union Pacific Monday, through the freight department, asked the "Soo" line for permission to put the rates in effect, as tariffs had been printed and considerable money spent in

iring up the rates. reply was received by the Union Paoffic up to meen yesterday from the "Soo" people, but it is expected they will agree to al-lowing the rates to take effect with the unlerstanding that a recheck be made after wards and the Portland matter settled to the

satisfaction of all parties. The rates, which will probably become effective about October 15, while considerable of a raise, will not permit the business origi nating on the coast to be diverted via the San Francisco gateway. Portland raised no end of a howl against the discrimination in class rates, but when it hears it has been film-flammed on the commodity rates there will be no peaceable living in the town.

NEARLY NINE MILLIONS.

Illinois Central's Passenger List from Chieage to the Fair Grounds.

CHICAGO, Sept. 25.-The annual report of the directors of the Illinois Central for the year ended June 30, 1894, shows the total net receipts to have been \$8,194,493. The gross receipts from traffic were \$20,657,553. and operating expenses and taxes \$14,369,-The gross receipts from traffic increased \$562,273, and the operating penses and the taxes increased \$85,481. report shows during the six months of the World's fair, 8,780,616 passengers were car-ried over the nine miles between the city and the grounds without serious accident any of them. Freight receipts for the year decreased \$527,588.

KANSAS CITY, Sept. 25 .- In octors of the Misseuri, Kansas & Texas railroad have in corporated the Southwestern Mineral rail way. The road, it is expected, will be completed within a year, and will extend from Joplin, Mo., to Parsons, Kan. It will be a branch of the "Katy" and give that line access to the Cherokee coal district in southeastern Kansas. The new company is capl talized at \$600,000.

READING REORGANIZATION.

Receivers Request Leave to Enter Into the Olcott-Earle Agreement.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 25.—The receivers of the Philadelphia & Reading company today filed a petition in the circuit court of the United States for the eastern district of Pennsylvania, praying that they may be permitted to enter into the agreement framed by the Olcott-Earle reorganization committee. The committee state that in their judgment the plan proposed for the readjustment of the affairs of the Reading company is just and practicable and if carried out will fully pre-serve and protect all rights and equities of the creditors and stockholders.

The petitioners pray that they may be authorized and that the company may be that in case the plan be carried into effect the petitioners may be authorized to make the payments therein scipulated for. October

15 has been set down for the hearing. SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 25 .- The Southern

Pacific company is making preparations to ircrease winter travel over the Sunset route without shelter, but reported himself in exto tempt the travelers away from other roads. Mrs. Cowan has been married thrice and has had three children. All of these have died in a mysterious manner. The Cowan lad suddenly died after the doctors had pronounced him out of danger. The matter is to be investigated. Mrs. Cowan has disappeared. This sudden departure has caused an increased clamor for immediate action on the part of the authorities.
