It Was a Bear Day in Grain with No Particular Cause.

THERE WAS COVERING OF SHORT WHEAT

Although This Was Beavy for a Time it Failed to Cause More Than a Fractional Advance from the Initial Decline.

CHICAGO, Sept. 26.-It was a bear day in the grain markets. With no particular cause aside from weak cables, prices declined all day, and the finish was limp and weak. December wheat closed %c lower; May corn ic lower and May oats &c lower. Provisions finished at a decline. Wheat opened weak. The shorts were given a good opportunity to cover and largely availed themselves of it. That steadied the market and occasionally there was enough of that class of buying during the forenoon to give an appearance of strength and to add a trifle to the opening figures. The covering of short wheat, although heavy for a time, failed to cause more than a fractional advance from the initial decline. The same parties who had in that way steadled the market turned around as sellers about noon and the market was found to be excedingly soft. The price then showed a heavy decline. December was at from 54c to 53%c, compared with 54%c at the close yesterday. It rose gradually to 54%c, but later broke to 53%c. Chicago receipts were 161 cars. Primary markets reported an aggregate of 778,399 bu, including receipts at Kansas City. Atlantic port clearances were 184,600 bu, in wheat and flour to the contract of the c gether. Foreign markets were weak. An unauthenticated report of damage to the Argentine crop had little influence upon the market. The market finished weak at 521½c for December.

The country holders have, however, gone weaker for some time and many of their stop loss orders were en-countered on today's decline and aggravated it. Much covering of short corn was done on the first break, but when the shorts saw their boying was the only support to the market, they put out more than double the quantity they had covered. was more generally current. There followed a firmer appearance on the covering of shorts already alluded to, but weakness pure and undeflied was the closing experience of the traders. The price declined to 50%c, and that was bid as the session closed.

The strong sympathy between corn and cats continued to be the feature of the latter market, in which a fair business was transacted. 
