> Increased Demand for Iron and Also an Increased Output - Boot and Shoe Manufacturers Having the Best Trade in History.

NEW YORK, Oct. 5 .- Dun's weekly review of trade, which issues temorrow, will say: With the chief crops of the west and south sinking in value, it is not strange that purchases of manufactured products are smaller than was expected. Wheat has couched the lowest point ever known for oplions, and cotton the lowest point ever known in any form with the present classification, and the accummulation of stocks in both products is discouraging for purchasers for an advance. Producers are compelled to sell at prices below the ordinary cost of raising crops, and in some western states there is also a lamentable failure in the corn crop. Under the circumstances it would be very strange if the demand for manufactured products should be quite as large as in other years. Wheat suffers most from ac-cumulation of stocks in sight, which are far beyond what is usually expected for the season, and the exports in September were unusually small. For the first week of October Atlantic exports were 1,097,372 bush-els, against 863,746 bushels last year, and western receipts were only 4,615,600 bushels against 6,130,687 bushels last year. These figures give some encouragement, but have little influence in view of the unusual visible supply. The price for cash wheat is a small

fraction higher for the week.

Corn receipts at the west have only been a third as large as they were last year, with exports amounting to nothing, but the price has not further declined after the heavy fall

during the previous fortnight.

Pork products were weak in tone, though only lard is quotably lower. Cotton is is cent lower, the cash price being the lowest known for forty-five years, and, considering the difference in classification, it is, per-haps, lower than at any time since 1849, and estimates that the crop is more than 10,000,-000 bales are more commonly credited now than estimates of 8,500,000 were two months ago. With favorable weather the yield seems

likely to be the largest ever known.

The condition of the industries is in some respects more satisfactory. Evidently there is larger demand for iron products than there was a month ago, though the increase in output has been somewhat greater than the increase in demand, so prices steadily tend downward. Bessemer pig is selling at \$10.90 at Pittsburg and bar iron at 95 cents, with steel hars at \$1.05, while a contract to suppress the principal western competitor in nail manufacture is expected to hold the price at \$1 for wire and 85 cents for cut price at \$1 for wire and \$5 cents for cut nails. The structural market is fairly active at the west, without change at the east. The coke output has now become the heaviest ever known, 149,770 tons for the week, the price is declining and steps are being taken to limit the supply.

The boot and shoe trade continues to deliver more goods than in any previous year, as it did in September, and most of the works.

as it did in September, and most of the works still have orders for one or two more weeks ahead, although for more medium priced goods. There is a little better demand this week for goods of higher quality, however, and the demand for leather is still reducing

the reserve.

The failures for the past week have been 219 in the United States, against 320 last year, and thirty-nine in Canada, against forty-five

last year.

BRADSTREET'S TRADE REVIEW. Some Features in the Situation Point to

Improvement. NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—Bradstreet's to-morrow, October 6, will say: While no radical change has appeared this week, there are features of the situation pointing to continued progress in the direction of improvement. This is true of the counof improvement. This is true of the county at large. Thus, in the eastern and middle states, while the larger cities do not report noteworthy changes, Providence announces that all industrial lines, notably manufacturing jewelers, have received liberal orders, with the exception of manufacturers of amachinery. Baltimere, too, reports larger sales in a few directions in the west. Corresponding reports come from Omaha, where a better feeling is reported throughout the tributary region, and there is more buying of dry goods, clothing, shoes and groceries. Duluth also finds business improved and jobbers in several lines have been encouraged. St. Louis and Kansas City report stimulation in wholesale as well as retail lines, due in part to an influx of visitors to the carnivals. From the south the most favorable reports come from Jacksonville, where wholesale trade is good and retail trade improving. Merchandise is moving satisfacturily from Savannah and from Charlestan and Chattanooga. The previously reported large volume of business of Chicago jobbers is maintained. At a number of points east and west the demand for money has increased, and large changes in the character of mercantile collections, as a rule, are in the direction of improvement. The price movement has improved little. Wheat, cornant stores, tin plate and a few other staples have remained steady in price, and refined sugar is lower for reasons which may or may not be similar to those governing prices in other lines. Concessions in prices have also been made for pigiron, steel billets, lumber, lard, coffee, cotton, print cloths and live hogs.

BRADSTREET'S FINANCIAL REVIEW.

Industrial Stocks the Principal Feature of the Market. NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—Bradstreet's finan-cial review will say tomorrow; The industrial stocks have again been the market; that is to say, two of the prominent members of that group, Sugar and Chicago Gas, have monopolized attention and in a measure decided the tendency of the entire stock list. Apart from this there were few developments of importance. Professional trading continues to be rampant and public interest, except in the investment market, where a conservative demand for securities is shown, is at a minimum. The rumors of complications between England and France seem to have created more or less of a "scare" in the London market, but this was not followed by any heavy selling of securities here for London account. Some few thousand shares were marketed, but scarcely enough to affect prices. The situation, in fact, so far as the general railroad list is concerned, is governed largely by the fact that the prevalence of cheap money renders holders unusually tenacious and indisposed to part with their shares. The tone of the market is as a whole weak and depressed, and particularly on Monday and Tuesday was it so, and a break in Sugar to 32% per cent on Saturday, accompanied by heavy transactions in that stock, influenced the temper of the traders, if it did not prove of very much effect on prices generally. Covering of the short interest in the leading industrials ensued, however, on Wednesday, and raillied the price of that stock, while discouragement appeared in the ranks of the bears in other stocks. 
