DECIDED ON WABASH WAGES

Precedent Established in Settlement of Union Pacific Case is Followed.

WOOLSON WILL NOT MAKE A GENERAL CUT

Federal Judge Holds that Caldwell's Post sition Was Right and Receiver's Petition is Denied-Slight Reduction for Local Engineers and Firemen.

In the United States circuit court in Council Bluffs yesterday Judge Woolsen handed down a decision in regard to the petition last May by Receiver J. F. Barnard asking for permission to reduce the wages of the employes of the Omaha and St. Louis (Wabash) railway in accordance with a schedule drawn up by him. The employes whose wages were to be affected filed a protest, and L. W. Ross was appointed master in chancery to hear evidence on both sides and render an opinion on the facts involved. He heard the evidence last summer and recommended that the schedule proposed by the receiver be concurred in. The evidence was heard by Judge Woolson at the term

just closed. In his decision, read just before the noon adjournment, he recites the doctrine laid down in the recent decision of Judge Caldwell that "the employes must be paid fair wages, even though no dividends may be paid," and holds that the rule must govern, always keeping in mind the general rule that a court must turn the road out of the hands of the receiver just as soon as such a thing can be safely done. A comparison between the wages paid on the Omaha & St. Louis and those on other roads running through the same kind of country follows, the result of which is to show that the former are not in excess of the latter excepting in two branches of the service. The court then says,

in substance: "The receiver shows that large numbers of railroad men are now out of employment, so that the places could be filled for less money. The court cannot regard this as having much weight. The retention of faithful, intelligent and capable employes is of more importance than a temporary decrease in earnings, and the court would not be justi-fied in discharging satisfactory employes because of present ability to employ others at reduced wages, thus, perhaps, rendering the road liable to accidents, for which the court would be legally and morally responsible. If the wages are no greater than on other roads running through the same country the reasons for a reduction should indeed be weighty. The evidence shows that some employes are hardly able to maintain their families on the present wages. The highest and best services cannot be expected from men compelled to live in a state of pinch and want. The receiver has administered his trust with ability and economy, but the court cannot concur in the reduction he

"The facts as found by the master in chancery are fully warranted by the evidence, but a decision must be governed by the principles of law above laid down. It is conceded by the employes that the pay of local freight enginemen and trainmen on this road are greater than on other lines with which comparison has been made, and their wages should accordingly be reduced. The proposed reduction, however, is not a proper one. The receiver suggests that the wages of local freight enginemen be reduced from 5 cents to 4 cents per mile, and those of local firemen be reduced from 5 7-10 per mile to 214 cents. The court orders that the reductions be: On engineers, to 4½ cents per mile, and on firemen to 2 4-10 cents The petition of the receiver will be overruled excepting as to these two par-

The stockholders, be-sides, bought the equipment and improvements for \$450,000 without opposition, making the total amount of cash necessary to close up the transaction a trifle over \$5,000,000. L. W. Bull, of New York, representing Chairman Olcott, of the stockholders' committee, made the bid. A check, duly certified for \$35,000 was decented with the control of the stockholders'. \$35,000, was deposited with the sheriff as a guaranty, and the entire sum will be paid over to Henry Seibert, trustee, at one of the local banks, either in gold or in the form of a certified check. A meeting, to perfect the reorganization of the road, is to be held to-morrow, and it is expected that the present corps of officials will be retained, though this is not definitely settled.
