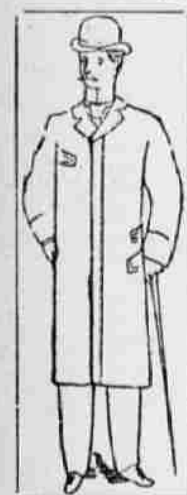

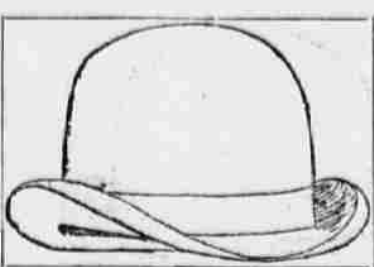

WANTS HIS CASH FROM ELLER

Decisive Steps Will Be Taken to Collect Money Held Back in Probate Cases.

JUDGE BAXTER SUES HIS PREDECESSOR

Money Amounting to Several Thousand Dollars and Belonging to Estates Which Eller Has Refused to Turn Over to His Successor—Court Notes.

Having become convinced that forbearance has ceased to be a virtue County Judge Baxter has taken the preliminary steps looking to the commencement of a suit against his predecessor, J. W. Eller, and his bondsmen for the recovery of a large sum of money that found its way into Eller's hands by virtue of the office which he held and which that gentleman has never accounted for.

It is charged that when ex-County Judge Shields passed the office over to Eller on January 7, 1892, he turned over to him a bond in the sum of \$1,649 in the Platte Saunders estate, which bond was secured by a mortgage on real estate in this county, the same having been executed by J. W. Lytle and wife, payable to the county judge and his successors in office.

In addition to this the records of the office furnish the information that during Eller's incumbency he collected \$288 in the F. A. McNamara estate, which amount has never been paid over to the county judge and his successors in office.

Judge Eller's Disclaimer. OMAHA, Oct. 11.—To the Editor of The Bee: In relation to the article in The Bee this evening, headlined "Wants His Cash from Eller," I desire to say that it is not my practice to answer accusations, but in this instance you appear to quote information received from Judge Baxter.

Before Judge Hopewell the case of Samuel Overgard against the Burlington road is on trial, where the plaintiff is seeking to recover the sum of \$300, alleged damages. The plaintiff charges that during the month of January, 1892, he was engaged in hauling garbage to the Jones street dump and that while so engaged an engine of the defendant's came along and killed two of the mules which were attached to one of the garbage wagons.

Frederick Drezel Estate. In the estate of Frederick Drezel deceased, the heirs have filed an application for letters of administration, asking that A. R.

Drexel and John H. Harte be appointed administrators. The property of the estate has been scheduled at \$15,000, the greater portion of which consists of personality.

An information has been filed before United States Commissioner Anderson against Max Levy, a Tenth street pawnbroker, charging him with passing a counterfeit silver dollar. The preliminary hearing will occur on Wednesday.

Assistant United States District Attorney Rush will go to Lomax today to try the case against William Young, assistant postmaster at Decatur, Gueter county. Young is accused of opening a letter to Mrs. James R. Allison from her husband containing an express order for \$5, which he is alleged to have cashed.

District Court Contingents.

On account of sickness in his family Judge Ambrose was not upon the bench yesterday.

The case of the state against Alva Chambers, charged with assault, was argued and submitted to the jury yesterday.

In the criminal section of the district court the case of the state against August Wallenburger is on trial. The prisoner is a resident of Florence and is charged with assault in this, that last August he assaulted and threatened the lives of seven boys of the town, all of whom were annoying him by calling him uncomplimentary names.

THREE HOUSES RUINED.

At 3:10 o'clock yesterday morning fire was discovered in the rear of residences at 1251 and 1253 South Sixteenth street. An alarm was sent in at once, but owing to the fact that the Sixteenth street viaduct is closed the fire apparatus was compelled to make quite a detour in order to reach the fire. During this time the flames had gained considerable headway and were fanned by a strong west wind. Lines of hose were quickly laid and when the water was turned on it was found that the pressure was very low and the streams were worthless.

The two residences at the above numbers were completely gutted and a one-story cottage in the rear of these buildings was entirely destroyed. These three houses were owned by Frank Kunzel, who occupied one of them. Frank Broder and Frank Adams occupied the other two. During the fire Fireman Reynolds of hose company No. 5 was quite badly cut by falling glass. His injuries are not serious. The loss on buildings will amount to \$5,000 and the loss on contents about \$1,000. No insurance.

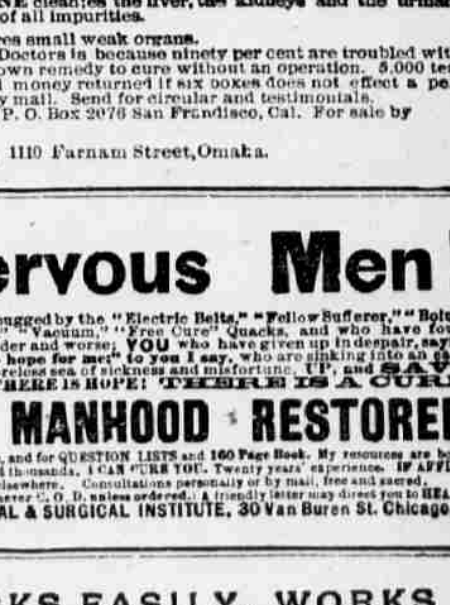
