THEY CLAIM IT'S A GRAB GAME.

James S. Chrissman Interposes a Snag in the War of the Manawa Officials. A petition was filed in the district court yesterday by James S. Chrissman, making the town of Manawa, its mayor, T. A. Wright, William Ballon, recorder, and Daniel Sheets, treasurer, defendants. It alleges that the defendants, for the purpose of obtaining money fraudulently and wrongfully from the taxpayers of the town, at the meeting of the Board of Trustees last Monday night passed a resolution directing the mayor and recorder to issue warrants in excess of \$4,000 to pay salaries of the town officials for the past twelve years, or ever since the incor-poration of the town. This suit is likely to come up for a trial at the present term of court, and it is claimed by Chrissman's attorneys that the so-called "salary grab" is made just at this time in order that the men whose property is to be set out from the rest of the town will have to pay their share of the salary which the officials and ex-officials did not get.
