abroad are large enough to kill any specula The output of pig iron was larger by 7,73 The output of pig iron was larger by 7,731 tons November 1, when it was 158,866 tons weekly, than it was October 1, and larger than a year ago, but it is still about 13 per cent below the output last May, before the great depression began. It is noted that nearly all the furnaces in the district depending on Conneisville coke and Lake Erie are now in operation with an output of 89,000 tons weekly out of a maximum in that region of 94,000 tons, but bessimer iron is rather weaker in Plitsburg, and prices for finished products of iron and steel have not improved. Some few wire rod mills have closed for lack of orders, and a few of the large steel making concerns have reduced hours of work. At the same time there is a decided improvement in the tone of the market and a general confidence that the business will improve.
