Never in the history of the worst days of fraud in Louisiana has there been so far."

NEW MEXICAN LEGISLATURE IN DOUBT. SANTA FE, Nov. 10.—At democratic headquarters today the election of Castro reprob-

lean, as delegate in congress, was conceded. His majority will be about 2,000. The territorial ruling is still in doubt, both parties claiming it, but conservative estimates agree that the lower house will be republican by a majority of two, and the democrats will have two majority in the council. The populists carried one county, San Juan, but elsewhere throughout the territory their vote was extremely light.

REPUBLICANS HOPE TO WIN BUT THE INDICATIONS ARE THE OTHER WAY. NASHVILLE, Nov. 10.—The American has full returns from sixty-nine counties and majority returns from nineteen counties. These returns give Turner, democrat, 2,738 majority over Evans, republican, and the remaining eight counties gave in 1892 a net republican majority of 307. Chairman Carr of the democratic committee, however, asserts that these counties will not be able to wipe out Turner's present lead. The republican committee still claims Evans' election p. m.—There is yet no solution that is official to the gubernatorial situation. There is much excitement, but the republican officials are constantly surrounded by troops. Both committees claim the election, but both say they have official returns from all the counties and can name the victor. The returns have come in earlier than ever before, but there has not been for thirty years as close a race in Tennessee.

THE DEMOCRATIC EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE PRACTICALLY ADMITS THE ELECTION OF EVANS ON THE FACE OF THE RETURNS. THE RE- PUBLICANS MEET TO CANVASS THE RETURNS. THE DEMOCRATS SAY THEY HAVE CONCLUSIVE EVIDENCE OF FRAUDS PERPETRATED IN MANY TENNESSEE COUNTIES AND THAT RETURNS FROM MOST OF THEM HAVE BEEN GROSSLY CORRUPTED. THERE ARE LARGER MAJORITIES FOR EVANS THAN HE RECEIVED AND THAT WHEN THESE ARE ELIMINATED, TURNER'S UNLAWFUL MAJORITY WOULD BE MAJORITY. FURTHER RETURNS TONIGHT FROM TWO COUNTIES SHOW THE FORMER STATEMENTS FROM WHICH WERE INCORRECT AND REDUCE TURNER'S VOTE ABOUT 1,500. THE DEMOCRATS SAY THAT CORRECTED RETURNS, ADMITS THAT EVANS HAS 650 OVER TURNER BY THE FACE OF THE RETURNS.

BUDD'S CHANCES FOR GOVERNOR HANG BY A VERY SLENDER THREAD. SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 10.—The close of the election week finds the politicians and the public generally in California very much at sea in regard to the result of the gubernatorial elections in this state. What was at first supposed to be a decided victory for Budd, the democratic candidate, has now developed into a question of very serious doubt and the official canvass will probably be left to decide the contest between Budd and his opponent, Estero. During the last twenty-four hours there has been a great reaction in Budd's plurality, and with the receipt of election returns from almost every county he suffers loss of a few more votes. There are 2,774 votes in the state, and in the event when returns had been received from 1,600 of them Budd apparently had a safe plurality of over 2,000, and the election was practically by every one. The situation has changed since then, however, and now with 3,063 precincts heard from his plurality has declined to 500. The democratic gubernatorial state central committee is claiming that Budd's plurality in the city of San Francisco will be 500 votes in excess of the 1,100 which had been generally accepted by the last day or two. If this claim is sustained, Budd's plurality now is 1,100, with over 200 precincts in the state to be canvassed. There is prospect now that if Budd is declared elected after the official canvass next week the republicans will contest it and carry the matter to the legislature, which is strongly republican. So far as the remainder of the state ticket is concerned the republicans have carried practically everything, and have also elected six of the seven congressmen.

WYOMING REPUBLICANS TO JOLLY. Tuesday's Victory to Be Celebrated at Cheyenne in Great Form. CHEYENNE, Nov. 10.—(Special.)—The republicans of Cheyenne will hold a monster jubilation meeting in this city Monday evening. Congressman Mondell, Governor Hildreth, and the other republican and county officers-elect will be on hand to express their gratification at the handsome support given them by the people of this city and county. There will be a magnificent torchlight procession, and the celebration will be one of the grandest affairs ever witnessed in the history of the state since the statehood day celebration.

NEW YORK CONSTITUTION CARRIED. NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—Returns received from all the districts in the city, the precincts missing, show a vote for the revised constitution of 72,354, against 56,068. The apportionment clause, three precincts only being missing, was carried by a vote of 69,517 to 54,000.

DEMOCRATS CLAIM THE ELECTION. WINCHESTER, Ky., Nov. 10.—Complete returns that Joseph M. Kendall, democrat, is elected to congress in the Tenth district by 194 votes over N. T. Hopkins, republican.
