Anxiety of the Breeders to Get to Market the Feature at Present.

RECEIPTS CONTINUE! VERY LIBERA

Cattle Sell from Stondy on Desirable Grad s to 10 Cents Lower on Rough Stock-Hogs Open-Lower, Closing at Stendy Prices.

WEDNESDAY, Nov. 14. There was another big run of stock today, 325 cars. The three days' receipts foot up 14,599 cattle, 22,900 hogs and 1,887 sheep Compared with arrivals for the first half of last week this is an increase of over 8,000 cattle and over 11,000 hogs, while sheep re-

ceipts show a decrease of 600. The very liberal supply of cattle included only a small proportion of strictly desirable beef steers, the general quality of the offer-

ings being rather below the recent by no means high average. Conditions were subings being rather below the recent by no means high average. Conditions were sub-stantially the same as on the two preceding days, and there was no radical change in prices. The fair to good beef cattle that the dressed beef men wanted and on which the speculative shippers would bid were readily salable at right around steady prices. Low grade stock was no usual dis-criminated against and the market for such was slow, with prices weak to 5e and 19c lower than Tuesday. It was a duil, mean market on anything except good stock, but considering the quality of the offerings a very fair clearance was made. Cow stuff was in tairly liberal supply and very good domand, particularly the fair to steady prices. Camers did not fare so well. 
