

An effort will be made to have the men ent cities of Nebraska attend and become personally acquainted with the people of Norfolk and vicinity. YEAST AND BAKING POWDER TRADE.

The home industry campaign inaugurated by The Bee in 1891 did a great deal for the local mapufacturers of yeast and baking powder, but it has not done as much as might have been accomplished. This has been due, apparently, to carelessness, largely on the part of consumers. While these two commodities are apparently of small importance, they enter so largely into daily use that the total consumption in the course of a year in a city like Omaha is something enormous.

It may not be generally known, but it is a fact, nevertheless, that the city of Omaha has one of the finest factories for the manufacture of dry hop yeast in the country. is located on Twenty-eighth street and the Belt line, and is a brick building 44x100 feet, three stories in height, with a one-story addition 26x44 feet. Although there is litmanufacturers, the Omaha yeast being, if facture, it has been uphill work to establish tirely to the indifference of the retail merchants and the carelessness of consumers When the merchant places an order for gro ceries, it is so convenient to include an order for yeast at the same time that the most of them forget all about the necessity of fur-nishing work for the laboring people of Omaha, and some eastern city gets the bus-iness that should remain at home.
