

This would involve the establishment, by such board or officer, of proper quarantine precautions, or the necessary aid and counsel to local authorities on the subject. prompt navice and mesistance to local boards of health officers in the suppression of contagious diseases, and in cases where there are no such local boards or officers, the immediate direction by the national board or officer of measures of suppression, constant and authentic information concerning the health of foreign countries and all parts of our own country as relate to contagious diseases; and consideration of regulations to be enforced in foreign prits to prevent the introduction of contagion into our cities and the measures of protection against contagious diseases of protection against contagious diseases in international conference with a view of adopting means of mutual assistance. If, with all the favor now accorded the sugar refining interest in our tariff laws, it still languishes to the extent of closing refineries and thousands of discharged workmen it would seem to present a hopeless case for reasonable legislative aid, and whatever clast is done or omitted I carnestly repeat here the recommendation I have made in another portion of this communication that the additional duty of one-tenth of I cent per pound laid upon sugar imported from countries paying a bounty on its export be abrogated. It seem to me that exceedingly important considerations point to the propriety of this amendment.

With the advent of a new tariff policy, not only calculated to releve the consumers of our land in the cost of their daily life, but to invite a better development of American thrift and create for us closer and more profitable commercial relations with the rest of the world, it follows as a logical and imperative necessity that we should at once remove the chief if not the only obstacle which has so long prevented our participation in the foreign carrying trade of the sea. STRIKE COMMISSION COMMENDED. By virtue of a statute of the United States, parsed in 1888, I appointed in July Inst Hon. John D. Kernan of the state of New York and Hon. Nicholas E. Worthington of the state of Illinois to form with Hon. Carroll D. Wright. commissioner of labor, who was designated by said statute, a commission for the purpose of making careful inquiry into the causes of the controversies between a tail railroads and their employes which had resulted in an extensive and destructive strike, accompanied by much violence and dangerous disturbance, with considerable less of life and great destruction of property.

The report of the commissioners has been submitted to me and will be transmitted to the congress with the evidence taken upon their investigation. Their work has been swell done and their standing and intelligence give assurance that the report and suggestions they make are worthy of careful consideration.

PROVIDING A SAFETY FUND.

In addition to the guarantee fund required, it is proposed to provide a safety fund for the immediate redemption of the circulating notes of failed banks by imposing a small annual tax, say one-half of 1 per cent, upon the average circulation of each bank until the fund amounts to 5 per cent of the total circulation outstanding. When a bank fails, its guarantee fund is to be paid into this safety fund and its notes are to be redeemed in the first instance from such safety fund thus augmented, any impairment of such fund caused thereby to be made good from the immediately available cash assets of said bank; and if these should be insufficient, such impairment to be made good by pro rata assessment among the other banks, their contributions constituting a first lien upon the assets of the failed bank in favor of the contributing banks.

As a further security, it is contemplated that the existing provision fixing the individual liability of stockholders is to be retained and the bank's indebtedness on account of its circulating notes is to be made a first lien on all its assets. For the purpose of meeting the expense of printing notes, official supervision, cancellation and other like charges, there shall be paid a tax of say one-half of I per cent per annum on the average amount of notes in circulation. It is further provided that there shall be no national bank notes issued of less cenomination than ten dollars; that each national bank, except in case of a failed bank, shall redeem or retire its notes in the first insunce at its own office or at agencies to be designated by it, and that no fixed reserve need be maintained on account of deposits.

Another very important feature of this plan is the exemption of state banks from taxation by the United States, in cases where it is shown to the satisfaction of the secretary of the treasury and comptroller of the currency by banks claiming such exemption, that they have not had outstanding their circulating notes exceeding 75 percent of their paid up and unimpaired capital; that their stockholders are individually liable for the redemption of their circulating notes to the full extent of their ownership of stock, that the liabilities of said banks upon their circulating notes constitutes, under their state law, a first lien upon their assets; that such banks have kept and maintained a guarantee fund in United States legal tender notes, including treasury notes of 1830, equal to 20 per cent of their outstanding circulating notes when presented at their principal or branch offices.

It is quite likely that this scheme may be usefully amended in some of its detains, but I am satisfied it furnishes a basis for very great improvement in our present banking and currency system.

I conclude this communication, fully appreciating that the responsibility for all legislation affecting the people of the United States reats upon their representatives in the congress, and assuring them that whether in accordance with recommendations I have made or not, I shall be glid to co-operate in perfecting any legislation that tends to the prosperity and welfare of our country.
