Emphatic Reply to Germany's Complaint of Insufficient Inspection. WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 .- The attention of the secretary of agriculture was called today, to the assertion of several papers that the action of the German government looking to a reimposition of restrictions up n live stock and meat was due to inadequate inspection by the department, owing to excessive re-

duction in the inspection force. "A suffi-cient answer to such criticisms," Secretary, Morton replied, "is to be found in the facts given at length in my rep-rt. The records of the bureau of animal industry show that during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1894, 15,000,000 pounds more of pork were microscepically inspected than in the year 1893.
