It was given out that the purchase was made by a syndicate of Chicago capitalists, but a thorough investigation falls to establish the truth of this report. It is believed that the syndicate in question is nothing more or less than the Union Pacific Coal company. It has been known for a long time that the Union Pacific has been making overtures, through Superintendent McGeath, for the purchase of several of the private mines at Rock Springs. The company and the owners of the several properties were unable to agree upon a

rice, and this is what has kept the deal hanging fire for several months. An understanding was finally arrived at last week. The fact that Superintendent Me-Geath was very conspicuous when the sale was made lends color to the general supposition that his interest in the consummation of the sale was due solely to the position he now occupies as the head of the Union Pa-

cific coal department, The sale includes the mines belonging to the Van Dyke Coal company, the Sweet-water Coal company and the Rock Springs Coal company. The purchase price is in the neighborhood of \$200,000. This deal will give the Union Pacific a practical monopoly of the coal business in the southern part of Wyoming. During the past two years there has been considerable complaint about the discrimination against the private mines in the matter of freight rates, and the matter would no doubt have been a subjeclegislation at the coming session of the legslature if this deal had not been made.
