"Early in the spring of 1892 there was received from Denver for transmission to an eastern client a \$4,000 note. It was delivered by an early morning mail and put, as sup-posed, into a convenient pigeon hole to receive proper attention at a later hour due time the note was required and could not be found. The pigeon hole was searched and everything in its vicinity was turned over; every folded paper and book carefully opened and examined in vain. Several hours were devoted to the search. Every review of the morning's work sent the mind to that pigeon hole as the place of temporary depigeon hole as the place of temporary deposit, but the most diligent scrutiny failed to find it.
