That is the way the official card of a distinguished visitor to Omaha read yesterday when the famous Japanese statesman handed his bristol to a Bee reporter at the union

The pride of the Japanese diplomatic service, accompanied by his title and three attaches of the Japanese foreign office, occupled five sections of the Pullman on the eastbound Union Pacific-Northwestern train which pulled out of the depot at 5:45 o'clock. Minister Kato has been prominent in Japanese governmental affairs for twelve years, is an ex-minister of finance and was at one time in charge of the foreign office. He is now enroute to the court of St. James to succeed the Viscount Oakl, who goes to Berlin, Germany, to represent Japan.

Minister Kato is a well educated, polished gentleman, 36 years of age. He speaks English fluently and has a splendid knowledge of English and American affairs, as well as being authority on matters at Tokio and Yokohama. In personal appearance he is small in stature, and a pair of keen, black eyes snap nervously behing a pair of gold

The minister is thoroughly Americanized in appearance and somewhat English in mannerisms. A fez cap with its golden tassel hanging down the back, is the only portion of the Oriental garb which the distinguished traveler retains. The balance of his dress is distinctively American. He is a good conversationalist and fully maintains the reputation of his countrymen for polite and affable manners.
