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NOT ANXIOUS TO PAY TAXES

Secret of the Receivability of the Lincoln Street Railway Company. CITY HELD THE SACK FOR FIFTY THOUSAND

Some of the Inside History of the Deal by Which the Federal Court's Aid Was Invoked to Strengthen Weak Property.

LINCOLN, Jan. 23. (Special Telegram.)—Receiver Brad Slaughter has filed an inventory of the Lincoln Street Railway Company's property with the clerk of the district court for Judge Dundy's consideration.

The inventory shows thirty-six miles of car lines, one brick one-story power house 90x56 feet, one two-story car house 100x134 feet, and one iron covered storage shed, 40x150.

It also lists the buildings and fences of the street ball park on leased grounds. The park includes thirty-eight closed motor cars, twenty-eight open motor cars, nine closed tractors, five horse cars, five closed cars in bad order and a job lot of trucks, gear, snow sweeps, etc.

There is said to be an attempt on the part of the company to evade payment of the taxes of the city of Lincoln by placing the company in the hands of a receiver.

The petition for said receiver, which has been returned for, and a copy of it, was set out through the orator, Joseph Sampson of Sioux City, Ia., that the company is insolvent and now has outstanding \$600,000 in bonds secured by a deed of trust on the property of the company's lines, of which deed the New York Security and Trust company is trustee.

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WAS NOT A SUDDEN MOVE

Foreclosure of Union Pacific Practically Decided on Six Months Ago. NECESSARY TO PROTECT ALL INTERESTS

No One Seems to Know Whether the Government Will Now Become a Party - Suits to Be Pushed Rapidly to Conclusion.

There is a great deal of unwritten history connected with the recent foreclosure suit brought by the trustees of the first mortgage bonds of the Union Pacific Railroad company before Judge Sanborn in St. Louis last week. It is understood that as early as last July Judge Sanborn intimated to the trustees of the first mortgage bonds that an action in foreclosure would have to be brought in order to keep the stockholders' interest in the property subject to the direction of the court, otherwise the court might decide to transfer the direction of the property back to the control of the company. This intimation from the court was changed by the existing condition of affairs, said a railway man, when the reorganization committee realized that only through foreclosure could any direct result be obtained in bringing together the aggregated properties.

It is a matter of record that the government directors in their report foresaw what would be the result if foreclosure was not secured and they emphatically announced that such a course would be unwise. The many complications which obtain relative to the main and branch lines of the Union Pacific Railway company. There are so many contracts, obligations, and interests, and a pressed condition of business operate against the advancement of the Union Pacific system, that it has become essentially necessary to have these contracts cancelled or revised along lines favorable to one of the parties at least to the contract. This could be done without foreclosure, and, in order to clear the property in position it was decided to bring a suit in foreclosure which would have been necessary under any circumstances if a readjustment of present contracts was not made.

As these suits in foreclosure are brought upon various lines and the present receivers are appointed under the bills of complaint, the old suits are cancelled or revised along lines favorable to one of the parties at least to the contract. This could be done without foreclosure, and, in order to clear the property in position it was decided to bring a suit in foreclosure which would have been necessary under any circumstances if a readjustment of present contracts was not made.

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
