

## WHISKY TRUST LIQUIDATION.

Motion to Oust Present Receivers Will Be Heard Saturday.

CHICAGO, Jan. 31.—The restraining order preventing the Whisky trust receivers from taking any action in the proceeding under which they were appointed will remain in force until Saturday morning. Judge Gross cup entered the order yesterday and expected today to hear arguments on a motion to ous the receivers. On account of the situation the court announced today that the motion will not be taken up until Saturday. He allowed the restraining order entered yesterday to remain in force until a decision is reached Saturday.

The conflict presents the paradox of the attorneys for both sides of the combat expressing extreme satisfaction with the status of the case. Each party claims it is in the right and has received all it asked for. When Judge Grosscup opened his court today there were present Attorneys Runnels and Burry, representing the receivers, Levy Mayer for the petitioning stockholders' committee, O. The president of the company did not combat the representation, and the receivers were appointed.
