It was first claimed that the resolution offered in the meeting by Mr. Lomax opening up the Short Line was misunderstood by all the other lines, and that in reality the Union Pacific had no intention of opening up the Oregon Short Line. The other lines intimated very positively that they had not Pacific then claimed that it had been entrapped, and that in any event it would not open up the Oregon Short Line. This announcement sent matters back with a terk to the original position, the boycott against the Union Pacific by the Rock Island and Burlington was again declared in force, and matters were worse than at the beginning. for everybody was full of wrath and signs of an agreement were far less numerous than symptoms of a fight.


