COUNTY EXPENSES RAISED

Final Result of Endeavors of the Commissioners to Retrench.

WILLIAMS CALLS THE WORK AN OUTRAGE

Salary Schedule Three Thousand Dollars in Excess of What Was Reported Necessary a Year Ago-Where the

There was any amount of suppressed ex-

sitement depicted on the faces of the county commissioners during their meeting yesterday afternoon. They were to declare to the people of Douglas county, who on all sides have been clamoring long and emphatically for more economy in the transaction of public business, that economy was out of the question-that it was impossible. Each one knew that while in every other line of business in the country the salaries of employes have been curtailed, that, while the largest commercial establishments in every state in the union have been forced by the present depression to reduce the number of their employes Douglas county must, instead of lowering salaries, increase them, and that not one clerk or other employe could be spared. Necessarily they were uneasy when the routine bus ness of the meeting had been concluded and the report of the special committee of the whole, which was appointed to fix the number of clerks to be employed by the different ounty officers and the compensation to be paid to them was received. Commission Stenberg read the report, and the following are the employes and their salaries as fixed by it:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE. Treasurer-One deputy at \$150; one chief clerk, \$125; one bookkeeper, \$100; one tax sale clerk, \$100; two office clerks, \$100 each ne check clerk, \$75. Salaries to be paid out of fees of the office. Sheriff-One deputy, \$100; one deputy, three deputies, each \$75; provided the fees

of the office are adequate. County Jail-One chief jailer, \$89; one assistant failer, \$65; one matron, \$50; from March 1, 1895. Salaries to be paid out of general fund. Register of Deeds-One deputy register

\$100; one deputy register, \$80; five recorders, \$60 each; one recorder, \$50. County Court—One chief clerk, \$100; one bookkeeper, \$75; one clerk civil docket, \$70 one probate clerk, \$55; two recorders. each. To take effect March 1, 1895, and to be paid out of fees of the office. County Attorney-One stenographer at \$40 to be paid out of the general fund, and the committee on court house and jail to be



ONLY ONE CHANGE. This is precisely as the officers are at tion of the county jail. At present there is a chief jailer employed and two assistants. One of these will be dismissed and a matron will be employed. There are no reductions in salaries, but rather an advance in the office of the county judge, where two clerks who now receive \$40 will get \$45; one who now works for \$60 will be paid \$70, and one mployed at \$65 will be raised to \$75 per month. This is a total increase in the expense of this office of \$30 per month.

There will be a gain of \$15 per month in exchanging one assistant jailer at \$65 for a matron at \$50 per month, but on the whole there is an increase of \$2,820 over what was declared necessary by the report of a year ago. This is accounted for by the fact that salaries of individuals have been advanced during the past year and additional help employed, and the present report continues these salaries and employes

REPORT "AN OUTRAGE."

When arguments were in order Chairman Williams took the floor.
"When I consider," he said, "the commercial and labor depression outside of this court house I cannot but believe this report to be an outrage upon the taxpayers of this county, and I shall not vote for its adoption. I do not believe the taxpayers will stand it, and I do not blame them. They cannot sustain us in it in the face of the fact that there are more people dependent upon the county for their living than ever before in its history, and this, too, when our finances have forced us to reduce the amount dispensed in charity over 33 per cent. So far as my own constit enough. Ninety-nine per cent of them have not during the past year realized a single cent upon their investments. But their taxes have gone on just the same, and now we are to increase them. But, gentlemen, I will not -I cannot have the heart to vote for this in crease of expenses, and in casting my vote I will give my reasons in writing that they may go on record." Mr. Williams' writter reasons were as follows:

"In view of the fact that the salaries paid by the county are in excess of those paid in commercial business requiring the same talent and efficiency, therefore, in my judgment, the salaries of all clerks in the employ of the county receiving over \$75 per m should be cut 10 per cent, except that of the deputy county treasurer, who should receiv the salary as per the report."

Stenberg also opposed the report, though, as chairman of the committee, he had been obliged to sign it. He said that they had examined the question on all sides, and while the report was all right in many respects, as a whole it did not meet his views.
"It is a hard matter to cut salaries, but the

occasion demands it, and in many instances we would be justified in doing it. If we do not make some reductions the taxpayers will SUITED LIVESEY AND JENKINS. Jenkins was in favor of the report just as was, and he would be willing to take the

"I am in favor of raising salaries instead of reducing them," he said. William Donnelly without doubt did a lot of thinking last night, and unless he comes to terms with Judge Scott he may do a whole lot more before he again walks the streets of Omaha a free man.

Donnelly is a gambler, or rather was gambler, during the palmy days of the knights of the green cloth in this city. He was employed in several houses devoted to the fickle goddess, last with "The Denver." and was selected by the grand jury as a man very likely able to throw some light upon the methods pursued by the gambling fraternity in Omaha. He was summoned before that body yesterday, and was a good witness. Among other statements made by him was that he had paid \$1,800 to a city

WILL MAKE HIM ANSWER. "Young man," asked Judge Scott, after gazing with rising color on the prisoner several minutes, "do you still refuse to answer the questions put to you by the grand jury? I will make you answer them if I have to keep you in jail for the remainder of my term. You must answer. Why do you refuse? Is it because your business is so dark that it will not hear the light of day? If so the some ness is so dark that it will not bear the light of day? If so, the sooner such a business is stamped out of this city forever the better it will be for the people Do you know the enormity of what you are charged with? I will show you. It were better for you, and better for society, had you strapped a couple of pistols at your belt and made people do your bidding with them than that you should take an oath to tell the truth and the whole truth before the grand jury, and then set that body at de-fiance. You have defied it; you have de-fied this court; you have defied the law, and you have defied the people. Do you think the law will stand it? I tell you no. Now, I

will give you a chance. Will you answer If you do, I will let you go." WANTED TO CONFER. "Judge," faltered Donnelly at this point, "I did not refuse flatly to answer. What I said was that I would go out and confer with this man to whom I gave this money
