PHASE OF UNION PACIFIC TROUBLES Suit of the Oregon Railway & Navigation

Company on at Portland. PORTLAND, Ore., March 5 .- A very important railway case involving over \$500,0 began in the United States district court today. E. McNeill, receiver of the Oregon Railway and Navigation company, and the Farmers Loan and Trust company have united in a petition to have the order appointing Receiver McNeill so modified as to absolve him from the payment of indebtedness con-tracted by the Union Pacific receivers in their operation of the Oregon Railway Navigation company before the appointme of Receiver McNeill and the Union Pacific went into the hands of the receivers. Receiver Clark and others claim, and it is not seriously disputed that the claim is cor-rect, that there was a large deficit in the earnings of the Oregon Railway and Naviga-tion properties and the old receivers were insisting upon protection for this deficit by way of a lien, claiming that they were en-titled to this protection, being receivers of he court and operating the properties under order of court. An agreed order, as entered, practically required Mr. McNeill to pay this deficit, to pay outstanding claims which were due to various parties throughout the state and elzewhere which had not been paid at the time by the old receivers, and in general provided that all material and supplies which had been furnished the Oregon Railway and Navigation company roads for

six months previous to the appointment of McNeill should be paid by him.
