Court Refuses to Order the Union Pacific to Pay Navigation Company Bills.

HEARING IN THE SHORT LINE RECEIVERSHIP

Ex-Senator Sanders Appears for the Petitioners in the Case for Separate Receivers—Urged the Rights of Junior Security Holders.

PORTLAND, Ore., March 13.—United States District Judge Bellinger today denied the petition for a modification of the order appointing E. McNary receiver of the Oregon Railway & Navigation company.

The accounts involved in the contest are, however, all to go before a master in chancery, except those on which payment is urgent, and such are to be provided for by special orders of the court on application and hearing.

Ex-Senator Sanders of Montana, one of the attorneys of the American Loan and Trust company in the Oregon Short Line and Utah Northern receivership case, today began the argument against the demurrer to the bill.

The proposition laid down was, he said, that the road must have the present receivers, that they are receiving the property and community roads. This, he claimed, was not equitable, even though the proposition was made by senior security holders, because the receivers were interested in the American Pacific securities and other securities of properties the receivers operate.

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TRUTH ABOUT SILVER

OMAHA, March 13.—To the Editor of The Bee: In your editorial on "Inharmonious Silverites" you remark: "It is time that the friends of a sound and stable currency put greater zeal in their efforts to educate popular opinion than they have been doing."

"The silverite propaganda must not be allowed to monopolize the field of controversy." Ah! that has the right ring.

Why should the absurd cry of "The crime of the demonetization of silver in 1873" be continually rung in our ears and be unanswered? Why should the epithets "photo-graph" and "the demon" be continually used to "capitalists and Wall street" as unchallenged?

The silly charge that the law of 1873 was the result of a conspiracy and was secretly slipped through the senate should be constantly met and its falsity exposed. Those of us who were in commercial business at that time were glad that, as a result of several years' careful discussion, limitations were put to the use of so heavy, unwieldy and inconvenient a currency as we had found.

How many persons have been carried more than 30 in silver at a time in their pockets? The banks of an eastern city at one time before the war were compelled to refuse to receive more than 10 in silver one time on deposit, and they could not induce their customers to receive it in large amounts, and it lay useless in their vaults.
