MASTERLY SAILING OF THE CRACK YACHTS

Britannia Had a Lead at the Start, but Los! it at the First Mark Boat and Was Two Minutes Behind at the End.

RECORD BREAKING WEATHER

Old Sol Puts Up a New Mark for the Month

HEAT GENERAL IN THE CENTRAL WEST

Nothing Like it Known Since the Weather Bureau Was Established - Wichita, Kan., Scores the Highest of Any Point Reported.

KANSAS CITY, March 29.- The mercury climbed up to 86 degrees today, breaking all previous records in this city so far as the United States signal office is concerned. The hot wave covered part of Nebraska and Iowa, the whole of Kansas and western Missouri, The hottest place in the country today was Wichita, Kan., with the thermometer at 90; Des Moines, Ia., came next with 88, and then Concordia, Kan., and Kansas City followed with \$6. Local showers are predicted for this section tomorrow, and easiern Missouri will suffer with the heat.

INDIANAPOLIS, March 29 .- A hot wave struck this vicinity today. At 7 a. m. the thermometer at the signal office marked 44 degrees, and at 2 p. m. It marked 82 degrees, a rise of nearly forty degrees in six hours, CINCINNATI, March 29.—The thermometer reached 84 degrees at 3 o'clock today, and remained that high some time. At 7 o'clock tonight it was 76 degrees and at 9 o'clock it was 73 degrees. No such weather was previously experienced here in March since the government weather bureau was es-tablished in 1870. There is no record previous to that date.

OTTUMWA, Ia., March 29.—(Special Tele-gram.)—This was the hottest day ever known in this section in March. The thermometer reached 89 degrees in the shade.
