

Security Market Opened Quite Friskly After the Holidays. LONDON, April 21.-The stock market opened briskly after the holidays, but the inclusion of peace between China and Japan did little to sustain the market. The olume of business during the week was noderate. Fears as to possible European

moderate. Fears as to possible European complications arising from the Japanese de-mands and the prospect of Japan prov-ing a successful competitor with Europe for the trade of China caused a feeling of uncertainty. On the whole, however, the tendency was rather upward. The cheap-ness of money induced renewed buying of gilt-edged securities. The mining share market was inactive, but irregular. Amer-ican railroad securities attracted plenty of attention. President Cleveland's letter en-couraged the buying of good bonds. The advances were: Lake Shore 4s, Milwaukee, Illinois Central and Reading firsts, each 2% per cent; Wubash 6s, 2 per cent; Atchi-son 4s, Denver preferred, Erie, Northern Pacific, Norfolk & Western, Union Pacific and Wubash preferred, N₂ per cent.
