After a Wild Spurt at the Opening Wheat Fluctuated All Day.

CORN SHORTS WERE FACTORS IN THE PIT

Brokers Purchased Oats Freely and Were Anxiously Watching the Market -That Cereal Was Panicky Late in the Day,

CHICAGO, April 22.-After a wild spur-At the opening and a slump in the middle of the session wheat closed 1%c higher for May. Heavy buying, largely by shorts, caused the advance. May corn closed %c higher, May oats the lower and provisions at a slight advance.

Wheat started up with a wild rush, opening trades being at 115c advance. Every one wanted to get May at 611/2c and July at 6216c, and sellers at such tempting advancover Saturday's prices were few. Almost instantly 62c was being bid for May and 62c for July, and it was only then that it was found possible by the greater number of the brokers having buying orders to find obtained such an impetus, however, that 624c and 634c for May and July respectively were paid before the trading got into a regular swing. The last named prices proved the culmination point of the advance and it took only five minutes from the start to reach it. The excitement gradually subsided and having done so the crowd began Liverpool sent quotations of an advance there of from 1½d to 2d per cental. Showers had visited a large area of the winter wheat country since Saturday; the northwestern receipts at Minneapolis and Dulath numbered 417 car loads, compared with only 178 cars a week ago, and 145 cars on the corresponding day of the year before. The total of today's primary market receipts was 215,000 bu., against 237,000 bu. on the corresponding day of last week. Export clearances were 306,000 bu, in wheat and flour together from Atlantic ports. The visible supply decreased 1,851,000 bu, against a decrease of 722,000 bu, at the corresponding time of the year before. The English visible supply decreased 1,250,000 bu for the week; the amount on ocean passage increased 1,220,000 bu. Argentine shipments for the week were 1,840,000 bu., compared with 2,618,000 bu. on the week before.

On the increase on ocean passage and the visible supply decrease of about 700,000 bu. less than had been looked for, the price of May slumped to 60%c in an irregular and unwilling style, but buying on a large scale set in again and carried the price back and up to 61%c, which was the price 1 closed at, July closing at from 62%c to 62½c. Shorts, where their presence was comparatively unsuspected, have developed themselves in the corn pit in large numbers. The demand for that long-time neglected cereal was surprisingly brisk when the market opened, as an advance of ic in May and July at the start will indicate. The first prices were 48%c and 48%c respectively, compared with 47%c for May and 47%c for July at the close on Saturday. Those prices were quickly raised to 48%c for May and 49%c for July, and they proved to be the highest points of the day's range. Subsequently there was a decline in May to 47%c and in July to 48% c, both prices being bid as the session was closing.

Oats started very firm and active. Shorts were still auxious and bought freely. The advance in wheat and corn also figured conspicuously in creating higher prices early in the day May started at 29%c and sold at 29%c. Elevator people took advantage of the higher prices and disposed of their holdings almost regardless. The pricy dropped and during the decline at the lower prices buying was resumed and increased. A wild and panicky session was passed from that time on, slacking up slightly at intervals, but resuming again with greater activity. May sold off to 29%c, railled to 29c and closed at that price. July delivery attracted the greater part of the attention. At the opening sales were made at from 29c to 29%. The decline took the price to 28%c, the raily to 28%c, where it rested, %c under Saturday's last quotation. At the close pork had established an advance for the day of 5c in May and 10c in July, lard 10c, and ribs from 7½c in May to 5c in July.

Nebraska Steers Brought the Best Prices of the Day. CHICAGO, April 22.—Cattle buyers have

n for so long that their supplies of dressed eef have become greatly reduced, and, consequently, they were in the market. The result was a better demand for good fat cattle, and as the receipts will reach only about 8,000 head orices were about 10c higher than during the choice native steers sold at from \$4 to \$6, and anything fancy would have sold possibly for \$6.25. In hogs the demand started in active early in the day, both eastern shippers and local packers being good buyers of desirable lots, and although the receipts were \$,000 head in excess of the number expected, prices were strong and a shade higher in some instances. Later in the morning, after buyers had secured the larger part of the offerings, prices were not so strong.
