CORN RULED HEAVY NEAR THE END

Early Strength in Wheat Sustained Corn for a Time but When the Former Turned Weak the Latter Followed Suit.

CHICAGO, May 14.-Wheat made a bold advance of 12c per bu. in the face of a but-tery of bearish statistics, but the price was beaten back and at the close was \$50 lower than on the day before. The bearish feature which prevailed in the end over crop damage reports and diminishing receipts and stocks was the absence of export demand to Europe at current prices. Corn ruled heavy near the end and lost 4c per bu., and oats lost 4c. Provisions ruled

The corn market was rather dull and for the most part weak. The early strength in wheat sustained corn for a time, but when the former turned weak the latter followed suit. The receipts were \$462 cars, and \$20 cars are estimated for tomorrow. Liverpool was quoted firm at \$10 advance, and Milmine, Bodman & Co., New York, reported having sold fourteen boat loads for export. The freezing weather of the last two nights and consequent necessity which is developing for a replanting of a good deal of the area in this and adjoining states did not have much effect, the general opinion being that the area to be replanted would in the end be found to be small, and, in any event, that replant corn had a good chance of making a crop. Benedict, brothers-in-law of the defaulting state treasurer, for the reason that he was not a fugitive from justice when the governor's requisi-tion was granted, and for the further reason that he is not being examined for the of-fense for which requisition was granted. The matter will be disposed of next Thurs-day in Sioux Falls.





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
