The special committee to whom was referred the question of securins legislative enactment on a poison law drafted house roll No. 252. This bill was referred to the legislative committee for its approval, and, being approved, was introduced in the house of representatives by Hon. W. D. Haller of Blair, who made a great effort to have the bill passed, but before it came up for final action a sifting committee was appointed, to whom all bills not yet passed by the legislature were referred, and it was thus that it was lost. House roll No. 533 met the same fate.

The most important question brought up during the year is the tax on alcohol or free alcohol, as under the Wilson tariff bill, and I hope you will thoroughly discuss this all important question.
