Wheat Started with Promise of a Wild Advance.

CROP DAMAGE REPORTS THE CAUSE

Range in Price at the Opening for July Wheat Was an Improvement Over the Close on Thursday.

CHICAGO, June 7 .- Helped by crop damage reports and strong cables, wheat started teday with promise of a wild advance, but became tame later under heavy realizing sales, closing but \$10 higher and ic under the top figures. Corn closed \$10 lower, oats \$10 lower and provisions lower for pork, but slightly higher for lard and ribs.

Wheat got a vigorous hoist at the open ing. The range in price for July at the start was from \$0% to 81c. Only one or two lots were secured at the lower figures at the time referred to, the great bulk of the first few minutes' business being at from 80%c to Sic. Inside of the next minute or two 14c was realized, but there was heavy trading for a few seconds at 81%c. The regular closing price yesterday was 79%c. There had been no rain in the winter wheat belt in the last twenty-four hours, and none was predicted for that space of time to come. Spring wheat had been again plentifully watered and more rain was plentifully watered and more rain was promised for tonight, and the fine promise it is giving helped to keep the market from getting beyond control. Perhaps the chief influence in preventing the price from running heavenward was the uncertainty regarding the rature of the fortheaming government report. The Liverpool market was 194 higher for futures and 3d up for spot wheat. Logan & Co.'s private cablegram from there remarked that there was a milling demand for wheat. Hitherto Liverpool dispatches have ascribed the advances there entirely to speculation. Berlin was from 1½ to 13, marks higher. Paris also sent improved quotations. The day's movement included twenty car loads received here, but only eleven cars came from the country, nine being from private city warehouses. Minneapolis and Duluth received 25 cars, compared with 272 cars on the concept were very light, amounting to only 89,000 bu, in wheat and flour together. St. Louis stocks have decreased 250,000 bu, so far this week, leaving them with only about 250,000 bu., according to the telegram from there. Immense quantities of long wheat were disposed of. Logan & Co. alone, it was reported, sold out \$,000,000 bu. The price of July dropped twice to 894c, and recovered as often to 81c. Its last drop took it to 79%c, but at the close 80%c was bid. Corn rose at the opening in sympathy with wheat, but became very weak and heiped to pail the latter off its perch near the close by the heaviness it displayed. The reports concerning the promise for the next crop seemed too good and the acreage planted too heavy to permit of any lasting enthusiasm on the bull side. July started at 53%c, as compared with 57%c at the close to 52%c. Oats were only fairly active. Fluctuations followed wheat and corn, opening promised for tonight, and the fine promise

The provision market opened firm at higher prices on account of the buoyancy with which wheat and corn inaugurated the day's business. It weakened later in response to the lead again given by the grain markets late in the session, and closed with a loss of from 5c to 7½c in pork, but rather firmer for lard and ribs. Lard at the opening was unchanged and at the close was nominally 2½c higher for the day, and ribs unchanged for September, but 2½c higher for July.

VEGETABLES.

The consumption of dried beans of all descriptions has been larger during the past year than in any previous twelve manths, says the New York Journal of Commerce. The crops last season were good and the supply was in excess of the average, but the consuming demand has brought the stock down, and at the present time it is estimated that the supply of foreign beans of all kinds in first hands is not more than \$2,000 bags, against about \$0.000 hat his corresponding date in 1884. In jobbern' hands the supply is even shorter that it was a y ar ago according to reports from different parts of the country, but there appears to be less in the west than described from that quarter of late. Pittsburg has taken a number of cars of pea beans and Cincinnal has also been a buyer during the past few days, whice from other weatern points frequent inquiries are received. of the interest shown by buyers in a season when track might ordinarity be expected to be light is that the beans furnish about the cheapest food in the market and that the demands of consumption during the winter and early spring months having exhausted the supplies of joithers and retailers, and both classes of distributers are renewing their shocks in antiquation of an advance in prices based on the reduced stocks in first hands. There has been no marked advance and noise is likely to occur, but disalers look for a steady and perhaps a slightly higher market before the new crop becomes available. If is reported that the stock of dried California limus in first hands is about exhausted, and, as a result, prices have advanced within the last two weeks from \$2.99 to \$3.10. little being now obtainable at the latter price. The quantity in sight is said not to be over one-twentieth of the visible supply at this date last year. Retailers have been buying sparingly for some time past, leaving the stock in the hands of jobbers, but even the latter are believed to have small supplies. Quotations:


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
