THOUGHT TO BE UNDER COVER NEAR BY

Several counts in the indictment against Fay Mattison, vice president of the defunct Ponca bank, were quashed in federal court

Mr. Mattison was indicted on nearly a dozen counts by the federal grand jury last January, when true bills against G. W. E. Dorsey, Frank Dorsey and other officials of the bank implicated in the latter's total wreck were returned by the jury. All of the indicted ex-bankers gave bond, except Mattison. He has not given any bond as yet, and, in fact, he has displayed a great lack of interest in

this respect. Just before the grand jury met last winter Mr. Mattison packed his trunk and bid his friends good-bye. He stated that he was going to Missouri, but he did not linger in that state long. When The Bee published the fact that his prolonged absence at the time was prompted by fear of federal authorities his friends were horrified, but now ever the most skeptical admit that Fay Mattison

is a fugitive from justice.

For months deputy United States marshals have been looking for the missing bank offibut without success. It is claimed now that Mattison ply in hiding to await developments and he is not in any foreign clime either.

It is hinted that when last seen he was in a quiet little hamlet remote from railways and that his personal appearance has been somewhat changed. But Mattison left his provincial retreat and disappeared suddenly a few weeks ago, headed for the east via St. At any rate the federal authorities have grown weary of the chase and have practi-

matter of the chase and have practically given it up temporarily. It is said that Mattison is awaiting results of the trial of his old associates and if the coast is sufficiently clear, with any prospect of dodging the jaws of the penitentiary, he will return and give himself up at the next term of the court when the cases will come up. He still has an indictment hanging over him on the count of "abstracting and misapplying funds of the Ponca National bank," and if brought to trial it will be on that charge. IN OMAHA GETTING EVIDENCE

New York Parties May Bring Suit on Account of Oriental Rug Sale.

Claim They Knew Nothing About the Sale Until it Was All Over and Other Fellows Had the Money to Which They Were Entitled.

The big Armenian rug sale of May 16, which was conducted at the Morse dry goods store by Sheriff Drexel for the benefit of the public desiring bargains in rare and costly eastern rugs, may yet develop into a sizeable lawsuit, the likelihood being that if such a suit is instituted it will be commenced in New York City, though the plaintiffs will have to depend for a large share of their testimony upon Omaha parties.

When the sheriff first advertised the fact that he would sell rugs under a series of attachments it was given out that at least \$100,000 worth of material would be placed on exhibition. Crowds rushed in to strike bargains, not a few people coming from a The sale proceeded for several days, but the stock was exaggerated as to

G. H. Topskyan & Co. were the debtors, eing a firm of Syrians, who started out from New York City. Their mode of operating was to place rugs on sale in various owns, Kansas City being the last town done before Omaha. They had rented space in Morse's for a few days' sale, telling the public that after the local demand was satisfied they would move elsewhere with the goods still left over. They never kept their promise, for H. S. Tayashanjian & Co., as New York Syrian firm which held \$12,000 of notes against Topakyan, began attachment occedings, under which ultimately the sale the rugs by the sheriff took place, pursu-

nt to the court's directions. Other New York creditors, particularly Lord & Taylor and Simonds & Co., claim to have sold the rugs to Topakyan and his silent to hope that the application will partner, Chauncey Storsy. While it is true that the sale was advertised, yet the sale took place almost as soon as New York would receive the announcement, so that there is talk of bringing a suit for about \$20,000, the amount of the money represented by the rugs on a regular market.






