WHEAT WAS FIRM AT THE DECLINE

Dpening Weakness and the Break Which Followed the Slight Advance Were Seemingly the Result of Lower Quotations.

CHICAGO, June 25.-The grain markets all opened weak and closed strong today. Compared with yesterday, wheat wound up with a gain of about 1%c, corn to and oats to. The 1%c advance in wheat was an eknowledgement of the extremely poor outlook for the winter wheat crop. Chlifornia now joins the army of the cripples with a prospective half crop, and bad reports were also received from other states. Provisions joined the procession and scored fair ad-

Wheat opened weak and at from 15c to %c under the closing price of the previous day. It was rather firm for a time at the lecline, and improved the or so in about ten minutes, then declined 3c. Reports of damage by rust in the northwest and disappointing threshing returns from this state kept the fever up, and St. Louis, as usual, kept the pot boiling with telegrams, which ran the gauntlet of crop damage, country milling dennaid and small stocks. The receipts here were only 24 cars, and twelve of these were for a private city house. Minneapolis and Duluth received 182 cars, compared with 70 a year ago. 
