Judiciary Committee's Report Must Be Without His Name.

WILL MAKE A LITTLE STATEMENT HIMSELF

Convinced Committee Was Without Authority to Investigate Police Board-Testimony of Mr. Rosewater Yesterday Afternoon.

The judiciary committee of the city council, which has been wrestling for the past three days with the task of making a show at investigating the Board of Fire and Police Commissioners, concluded its labors yesterday afternoon. The greater part of yesterday's session was occupied by the testimony of Mr. Edward Rosewater, who corrected some misstatements that were made by ex-Sergeant Haze in his testimony the day before. Following this Chairman Sounders interrogated Mr. Resewater in detail in regard to the alleged fact that he was more or less responsible for the recent dismissals in the police des partment, and his questions were fully and

positively answered. Mr. Rosewater sold that in his testimony before the committee Haze swore that he had been fully and completely exonerated by the Board of Fire and Polica Commissioners on the charges preferred by Mr. Rosewater of interfering with the operation of the department by inducing two young girls, Bertha Reichenbach and Laura Day, not to go to the Milford home, where arrangements had been made by the police to send them. COVERED BY STRICKLER.

The statement made by Haze was abso lutely false, and there was nothing to show that the charges had been acted on by the board. "At the time the charges were filed." continued Mr. Resewater, "several articles appeared in The Bee in which attention was called to the incompetence and dishonesty of various police officers.
