EXPECT RECOGNITION OF MEXICO. Quesada's Mission Said to Have Been Successful.

NEW YORK, Sept. 17.-Cuban sympathizers in this city said tonight that Mexico would recognize the insurgents as belligerents within a few days. They based their assertion on private dispatches received from the City of Mexico. Senor Gonzales de Quesada, secretary of the Cuban revolutionary party in America, the dispatch said, arrived at the Mexican capital last Saturday. He went to the home of the minister of foreign affairs and was closeted with him until after midnight.
