LINCOLN, Sept. 25 .- (Special.)-Indications point to a reorganization of the state fish commission at an early date. Measra H. Oakley of Lincoln and J. Meikle of Omaha, the republican commissioners, called on the governor late this afternoon, and W. L. May of Omaha the democratic member, was in consultation with the executive yesterday. It is known that there has been considerable friction recently among the members of the commission, and considerable animosity was displayed during the Omaha state fair. The cakes of ice floating around in the brook trout aquariums were not cooler than the atmosphere in the fisherles exhibit building when Commissioner May came in contact with his associates

The cause of all this ill feeling seems be M. E. O'Brien, superintendent of the fisheries. Mr. O'Brien draws a sa'ary of \$1,500, besides house rent and incidentals. When he was appointed O'Brien was support to be a democrat, but during the last state campaign he lent his efforts to the element of republicans represented by Majors and similar leaders. He was especially bitter in his fight on Edgar Howard, editor of the Papillion Times, a warm personal friend of Governor Holcomb. It is understood that Mr. May has been in favor of relieving Mr. O'Brien from duty, while the republican members have insisted on his retention.

After the conference today between Governor Holcomb and Messrs. Meikle and Oakley, a Lincoln gentleman who is very friendly with one of the commissioners remarked that tee are made delegates.
