The republican county convention held yesterday was something of a record breaker in its way. It lasted nearly five hours at Washington hall, but that was only a small part of the performance.

With Nondescript Curs He Beats Any Breeder of Standards.

PROFITS REAL, BUT BASIS FICTITIOUS

Another Chapter in Dog Pound Fraud Hinting at How Long It Has Been Practiced—Profits Since April.

Now that the wholesale fraud which has been perpetrated on the city by Dogcatcher John Spoerl, aided by Meat Inspector Frank Has, has been exposed, it would be of interest to know just how far back this system of robbery extends.

The force employed by Mr. Spoerl is composed of a dogcatcher and a poundkeeper. The wagon used for his business is a four-wheeled affair of the "cracky" variety, and a box 2x5 feet, made of rough boards nailed on the frame, comprises the cage in which the captured dogs are placed.

Every four days unclaimed dogs are put in a box that is nailed on two wheels, to which there is a long rope attached, and run into the river. One of the dog catchers carries a taxidermy outfit, and the taxidermy is done near Sixth and Jackson streets.
