SHOWS SOME STARTLING FIGURES. October Crop Report Indicates a Larger Yield than Anticipated. CHICAGO, Sept. 30.—The October crop report of the Orange Judd Farmer, based upon county returns, estimates the rate of yield of wheat at 12.6 bushels and the total crop at 459,590,000 bushels, divided into 200,000,000 winter and 159,590,000 spring. This shows the winter wheat yield larger than was expected, but the quality is poor and a considerable amount of the crop has been lost to the elements.
