But Frank's proverbial good luck was again in evidence Thomas was out of fown, Duncan was sick. and in the absence of a quorum the meeting was adjourned until the same hour today. In the meantime the inspector continues to draw his malary,

While waiting for a quorum Commissloper Saville read a communication from Frank in which he declared that there was no truth in the charges which had been made against him, and requested the board to appoint a committee to investigate. The committee idea fell flat, but Dr. Saville opined that the board had no business with Frank' doings anywsy. He was appointed by the mayor and confirmed by the council, and i was the task of the council to take notice of his misdeeds. Mayor Bents quashed the outention by producing an opinion from My Attorney Connell, which stated that secording to the charter the mest inspector was under the central of the Board of Health and the board had a perfect right to deal with him as it saw fit. The poard then adjourned, while Frank grinned his approba-

And as no one disputed the assertion, Frank claimed the decision on the first round. SEVERAL WAYS OF STEALING.

The steal in the dog calching department account of which the inspector is now on the carpet was unear had by Chief White's descrives. It had been suspected for a long time that the city was being bilked through paying for the putalive drawning of fictitious ars, and the police investigation established the fact and disclosed the culprits. It in-dicated that out of 385 dogs which the city had paid for in July at the rate of \$1 each only 125 had any existence in fact. Further investigation discovered that much the same state of affairs had existed in previous months. Frank had been detailed by the Board of Health to see that the poundmaster did not be seen detailed by the se did not pad his reports, but he promptly endorsed Speerl's inflated bills and the city held the sack.

Evidence continues to accumulate which indicates that there were many ways in which the dog catching combine managed t acquire more good hard dollars than were contemplated by the city government. Num-erous cases have been cited in which the dog catchers were not particular whether their victim had a tag or not. They made their trips through the better parties of the resi-dence district early in the day and watched their chance to get hold of a dog which had some commercial value. All sorts of means were used to lure a canine of that description out into the street and once in reach the wire noose closed around his neck, tag or no tag. Owing to the peculiar surroundings of the pound it was practically imposible to regain possession of a dog which had once been taken. If a woman missed her pet and found that it had been carried off by the dog catchers she had to go to the pound, where she was complacently re-quested to look for herself. If she had the hardihood to venture down to the shanty where the degs were kept she was assailed the door by a stench so unbearable that she was compelled to beat a retreat, leaving her dog to the mercles of the poundmaster. If the dog was valuable it was discosed of by an outside man, while if it failed to find a market the poundmaster still had the \$1.22 which he obtained from the city and for the sale of the skin. Altogether the dog pound was made a very profitable institution aside from the revenue which was illegally derived





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
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
