After the ordinances had been declared duly passed Kennard submitted a resolution by which a glittering opportunity was offered to some of the city officials whose After the ordinances had been declared fered to some of the city officials whose salaries were beyond the reach of the council manic axe to come in and make themselves popular. The resolution recited the allegation that some of these officials had been first and foremost in their advocacy of retrenchment and invited the heads of all departments from mayor down to meat inspector to submit to the council a communication designating what portion of their salary they were willing to contribute to swell the grand finale of retrenchment in 1896. The resolution was carried.

LIST OF JUDGES AND CLERKS. The mayor submitted his appointments of judges and clerks of election. Before the appointments were considered Kennard moved that when the council adjourned it should be to Wednesday night and the motion was carried over the protest of the minority Taylor then moved that the appointments be referred to the committee on judiciary. Howell objected. He stated that there was no certainty that a quorum could be secured the following night and that there should be no time lost in acting on the appointments, as but a few days remained in which the men appointed could qualify. He moved that the appointments be confirmed, but President Edwards ruled that he was out of order and Taylor's motion prevailed.

Cliy Attorney Connell recommended that the damage suit of Frank J. Romatke against the city be settled for \$200. Adopted. The Board of Fire and Police Commis-sioners was granted permission to use the council chamber November 2 for civil service examination.
Sergeant-at-Arms Planck was granted a

three days' leave of absence.

The city treasurer was directed by resolution to notify the county treasurer to eliminate from the list of property offered for sale on account of unpaid taxes the property of the Omaha Belt Line railway in Omaha. The tax on this property has been paid ac-cording to the valuation of the state board and the matter is thus allowed to rest until the pending legal controversy is decided. City Electrician Schurig submitted a de-tailed report on the cost of an electric plant that would light the city hall and No. 3 engine house and operate the elevators in the city hall. Breumstances Surrounding Killing of Prof. Evans Puzzling His Friends. CEDAR RAPIDS, Ia., Oct. 29 .- (Special.)-David W. Evans of Pipestone, Minn., was in the city a couple of days ago on his way home from Osage. He is a brother of Prof. Price V. Evans, who met his death in such a mysterious manner on the river bank near Osage October 14. It is one of the strangest cases in the annals of lowa. Prof. Evans was a young man, born and reared near Wil-Hamsburg, in Iowa county. He had secured a liberal education and was the principal of the High school at Osage. He had bright prospects before him, and his sudden death has been a sad blow to his relatives. His

brother tells substantially the following story Two or three weeks before his death he and purchased a revolver and had been in the habit of taking a stroll down to the river bank after school hours and engaging in tar-get practice. He had found a suitable place, which he visited each time, as the bullets in tree showed. Monday evening, October 14, getting his revolver, he went down to his accustomed place on the river bank. He did not appear in the school room the next morning, but no inquiries were made, it being supposed that perhaps he was ill and would be present in the afternoon. When the after-noon came and he did not put in appear-ance his room was visited to ascertain the cause. Here the discovery was made that he had not been in his room since Monday evenpaper on the "University Extension Course ing. A search was instituted and his body for Pastors." A discussion on this theme oconce summoned a jury and an inquest was held. Two bullet holes were found in the head, and when all the testimony was taken and summed up the jury was about ready to find a verdict that he had committed su shipment to Williamsburg for burial in the family lot it was discovered that there was a hird wound, a bullet having been fired through the heart. The coroner's jury then returned a verdict of murder. After the body was taken to Williamsburg a post mortem was held, when it was discovered that there had been no hemorrhage, either external or internal, from the wound in the preast, indicating the shot had been fired after death and after circulation of the blood had stopped, thus disproving the suic the-ory, as it would be an utter impossibility for one to fire two fatal shots into the head and then send a bullet through the heart. The brother has many other reasons for be-

leving the young man was murdered. There were absolutely no signs of insanity which had been assigned as a possible cause of suicide. He wassengaged to an estimable young lady, a graduate of lowa college and at present a teacher in the public schools at Panora. He had on the Sunday before his death written her a long and cheerful letter, telling her of his plans for the future, and more particularly of what he expected to do during the coming week. There was not a single word in the entire letter to indicate that he was discouraged, or even contemplated taking his life. He had no enemies, no rivals in love, and

so far as known now there was no reason in the world why any one should desire his life. The object was not robbery, as his watch and money were not disturbed The officials of the county in which he met his death are now reasonably certain he was nurdered and are leaving no stone unturned to clear up the mystery and bring the mur-lerer to justice.
