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SUGGESTIONS ARE POINTED

Report of Commissioner Lochren Likely to Create a Stir.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—Commissioner William L. Lochren of the pension office in his annual report makes several pointed suggestions. Under the head: "Patriotism and Penitence," he says: "Those men who enlisted early and fought the battles of the war were not moved by mercenary considerations, and unless actually disabled did not show the haste in applying for pensions manifested by those who enlisted near the close of the war for large bounties and did little actual service and who are now the noisiest in clamoring for more pensions."
