AS TO REGISTERED WARRANTS.

"Registered warrants, as a rule, gravitate into the hands of a few buyers and it is sel-dom that a single warrant is presented for payment. Usually they come in in large blocks. HOUSE BUILT FOR SPITE.

## A New York Dwelling Five Feet Wide and Four Stories High.

Five feet wide and four stories high are the dimensions of the queerest house in this city, says the New York Press.
