Praises the Work of the Artillery and Cavalry.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20 .- General Miles who commanded the Department of the East during the last fiscal year, in his annual report says the instruction and efficiency of the cavalry was excellent. The instructions of the artillery was embarrassed by want of modern artillery and material, but in their absence the officers have made creditable efforts to keep abreast of the times. The general recommends that the posts he supplied with "sub-calibres" for practice work with heavy artillery, and the enlistment for the long term of ten years of a special class of non-commissioned officers to be traine as experts in artillery fire.
